Selected Securities

Hold Interest On Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, March 19—(CP)—Selected securities continued to hold the trading interest on the stock exchange and curb market today and changes were mostly fractional. Papers were mixed, individual issues modestly improved and balance of list about steady with some strong spots in mainly quiet dealings. Mines were again dull and lightly exchanged.

Cub Aircraft, Massey, Seagraves, Brown, Montreal Paper, St. Lawrence Corporation, C.P.R., Abitibi Common, International Paper and Consolidated were the more heavily traded issues and accounted for about one-half of the non-mining volume total.

St. Lawrence Corporation closed unchanged in papers and erased earlier slips while Abitibi Common upped 1-4, Brown dropped 1-8 and International converted a rise into a loss of 1-4. Consolidated held steady, Abitibi Pfd, was unchanged. Price added 1-2 and Great Lakes 1 1-4.

Cub converted a previous down into a rise of five cents at \$1.90 in Industrials. Massey was active and advanced 3-4 at 21 and C. W. Lumber was 1-4 better. Seagraves showed moderately enthusiastic response to record net profits for the quarter and increased 5-8 at 16 3/4. Canadian Breweries upped 1-4. Alco "A" was unchanged and Alco "B" slipped 1-2. Lewis was 1-8 higher in the miscellaneous section.

C.P.R. gained 1-4 at 13 3-4 in carriers while in a quiet utility group, Montreal Power was unchanged and unchanged up 1-8. In remainder of list, Nickel and Hudson Bay were unchanged in metals and Noranda and Aluminum easier. Imperial lost 1-4 in oils.

Canada's Black Market Limited, Gordon Says

OTTAWA, March 18—(CP)—In relation to other countries, Canada's black market has been "very, very limited", Donald Gordon said today, and it was "not a major headache of price control."

Testifying before the Commons Banking committee, the Prices Board chairman said "I don't maintain that I am a superman, but I think we have a fair idea of what has been going on."

"With a few exceptions, we have not found any organized black markets. They have been on a small scale and had no chronic or serious aspects. . . I would say without hesitation that the Canadian people are basically honest."

He said Canada's subsidy bill had been vanishing rapidly in recent months and defended its overall effect on consumer prices as "a very substantial" saving.

In June 1946, the Canadian cost-of-living index was 124 as compared with 133 in the U. S. while in January they were 126 and 153 respectively.
