Building Zone Regulations Under Town Planning Act

Those planning to build dwellings in the suburban area of the City, which includes that section from the North River on the west side to the Hillboro Road on the East, will find the restrictions...

The conditions for the building and use of land in the different zones surrounding the City are laid down in the regulations under the provisions of the Town Planning Act...

Two and Four but it contains the oil tanks, jail, and cucumber plant and thus has been classified with the most restricted residential areas followed by zones Four and Five (Parkdale section) for which more allowances have been made.

Zone Three lies between zones Two and Four but it contains the oil tanks, jail, and cucumber plant and thus has been classified with the most restricted residential areas followed by zones Four and Five (Parkdale section) for which more allowances have been made.

Zone Two comprises the area bounded on the South by the City limits, on the West by zone One, on the North by Belvedere Avenue and on the East by Malpeque Road. This is the multiple dwelling zone.

Zone One is bounded on the South by the City limits, on the North by the St. Peter's Road, on the Northeast by a road leading from the Belvedere on the St. Peter's Road to Kensington Road and on the southeast by the Kensington Road.

Zone Four lies on the North side of the St. Peter's Road on the left hand side leading out of the City. Opposite it on the other side of the road is zone Five.

Zone Five is bounded on the southwest by the City limits, on the Northwest by the St. Peter's Road, on the Northeast by a road leading from the Belvedere on the St. Peter's Road to Kensington Road and on the southeast by the Kensington Road.

Zone Three and Six may be used for any purpose, provided these purposes are within existing law. Industrial plants of any kind will be built in these areas.

Some types of buildings will be for a tannery, fertilizer manufacture, gas manufacture, used car junk, stables, slaughter houses, garbage, cement or lime manufacture and distillation of bones.

The regulations for the area state that every main building must be located on a lot and in no case shall there be more than one main building on a lot of minimum size except in the case of a tourist camp.

Permits will be required for the erection of any building worth more than \$1,000, for the digging of a well and for the construction or installation of any septic tank.

Credit Unions Grant Objected To By Mr. Clark

The Credit Unions took a rap in the Legislature yesterday from Mr. Keir Clark, Liberal member for Third King's, during committee discussion of the Estimates.

Dr. MacMillan had stated that the last among the Miscellaneous Grants - that of \$5,000 for the Blood Donor Service (Red Cross) - was the best one of all because it was "saving human lives every day."

Mr. Clark agreed, and went on to say that while the last grant was the best, the first grant (of \$4,500 to Credit Unions and Co-operatives) was "the worst."

"If there was any need of the grant it was when this movement was started first," he said. "But I cannot see where a body of people who have progressed to the extent of the Credit Unions are any longer entitled to receive grants from this Government. I think, equally, that any one in private business has as much right to come into this House and ask for a grant as the Credit Unions."

Mr. J. H. Richard, 1st Prince, said it was very nice for the Credit Unions to get a \$4,500 grant, but the Fisheries Federation gets only \$500. "I think that should be adjusted," he said.

Premier Jones referred with approval to the grant of \$1,000 to harness racing clubs. This was a recognition of the status of harness horse breeding in this Province. It is given for the encouragement of futurity races held each year by Island bred horses.

He understood there were nearly 1,000 horses to be entered in these races this year. As much, perhaps, as is paid out in recovery taxes by the Government through taxes on pari-mutuel machines.

Dr. MacMillan: "In other words it's an investment - a good investment."
