In compliance with a notice given by the High Sheriff of King's County, a Public Meeting of the inhabitants of Georgetown and south of Grand River, was held at the Court House on Tuesday the 16th instant, for the purpose of forming a Committee for that portion of King's County, and to appoint collectors on the out-districts thereof, for receiving contributions in aid of the Patriotic Fund.

On motion of W. Sanderson, Esq., seconded by Hugh Macdonald, Esq.—the Under Sheriff, Mr. H. Williams, was called to the chair.

On motion of Hugh Macdonald, Esq., seconded by Lemuel C. Owen, Esq.—W. Sanderson was appointed Secretary.

On motion of John Smith, Esq., seconded by W. Sanderson, Esq.—Hugh Macdonald, Esq., was appointed Treasurer.

The Requisition for calling the meeting, and the proceedings of the Public Meeting held in Charlottetown in aid of the Patriotic Fund, being severally read by the Secretary the following Resolutions were then put and carried unanimously:—

The Rev. R. T. Roach then addressed the meeting, at considerable length; among many good ideas, embraced in his speech, the following was not the least; "That an appeal be made to the female portion of every family in Prince Edward Island, for a pair of stockings or socks, which would make quite an agreeable offering to the poor fellows whose beamed feet now tread the heights of Balacava and Sebastopol." He moved the following Resolution, seconded by Hugh Macdonald, Esq.—

1st. Resolved, That this meeting does joyfully and loyally acknowledge their fidelity to the Queen's most gracious Majesty, and their sympathies for the brave soldiers, sailors, and marines, who have fallen, or whose lives must hereafter be sacrificed in battle, with the enemy, or otherwise, by casualties of war, in defence of the invaded liberties of our ally, and of the national independence and civilization of Europe; and will aid to the utmost of its power the Patriotic Fund recently established by Her Majesty for the relief of their widows and for the relief and education of their orphans.
