**Scrappy Saint Dunstan's Out hustle PWC Squad**

Saint Dunstan's High School facing a 2-1 deficit and invitation from the Charlottetown and District finals last night as they started the third period, refused to bow out under the pressure and rode the heroics of the line of Billy Weatherbie, Alan Flood and Gary Cudmore to a decisive 5-3 victory over the Prince of Wales Welshmen. The win in the third game of the series was the first for SDHS and leaves the tally at 2-1 for the Welshmen.

Alan Flood was the individual star of the evening as he banged home three goals and set up another but his line mates too deserve their share of the credit. Gary Cudmore finished out the goal scoring for the Saints as he had two and one assist while Bill Weatherbie made three of the goals possibly with his brilliant play and passes around the net.

For the Welshmen, who sagged visibly after the Saints scored their fourth goal, Joey Brown, Bob Doherty and Gus Houston had one each.

The Forum was a noisy place as the game got underway but both clubs, seemingly unbothered by the noise got down to some extremely close checking and the only shot in the first five minutes was a rink long icing attempt by the Welshmen. However after that the game opened up somewhat.

Both teams missed a couple of golden opportunities on power play opportunities but the Welshmen opened the scoring a minute or so after the game had been delayed to clean the remnants of some object off the ice. Ken Ballen drilled a shot from just inside the blue line and Joey Brown banged the puck in after Mike Brown had appeared to have it smothered in his pads.

Alan Flood tied the score after having missed a chance minutes before Flood stole the puck off an errant PWC defenceman and hit the lower right hand corner with a bullet drive. Shortly after that both he and Joey Brown met in a joust along the boards. Both players received penalties for unnecessary roughness.

The Saints came out at the beginning of the second with fire in their eyes and the number of chances that they missed on breakaways, posts and deflections that were just wide could have won the game for them right there.

The Welshmen's Ken Ballen took the club's penalty of the session at the 12.50 mark but things didn't turn out just like the Saints had hoped they would. Barry Turner partially blocked a point shot by the Saints and after having gained control of the puck passed it to Doherty who made no mistake with his breakaway opportunity. His low wrist shot caught the far corner and PWC was ahead again.

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. (CP)—Saskatchewan scored an upset 8-7 triumph over defending champion Alberta in the fourth round of the national mixed curling championship Tuesday night.

The victory was the first for Ted Jurista's rink from Vancouver, Sask., in three starts while the loss pushed Calgary's Lee Green to third spot in the standing behind undefeated Northern Ontario and Manitoba.

Bill Tetley of Port Arthur continued his winning streak when he downed Prince Edward Island 10-6 to remain on top with four victories and no losses.

Manitoba, who had the bye in the evening draw, is in second place with a 3-0 win-loss record. Then it's Alberta with three wins and one loss and British Columbia and Nova Scotia tied for fourth spot, both with 2-2 win-loss records.

The fourth round also saw 10th-place New Brunswick defeat sixth-place Newfoundland with a narrow 8-7 margin while Nova Scotia defeated Quebec 8-5, and British Columbia downed last-place Ontario 7-6.

Alberta's defending champion was one of four rinks still undefeated after the third round of the national mixed curling championship Tuesday.

Lee Green directed his Calgary unit to a close 5-4 decision over Herb MacNeil of Sydney, N.S. to crowd into first place with Northern Ontario and Manitoba, who kept pace with their third straight triumphs.

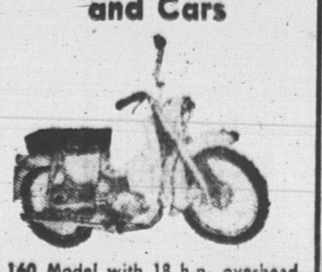

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**Cassius Clay And Chuvalo Pass Medicals For Fight**

TORONTO (CP)—A satisfied atmosphere filled the Ontario Athletic Commission office Tuesday following a pre-fight medical examination for the March 29 heavyweight bout between Cassius Clay and George Chuvalo.

The fighters were pronounced physically fit by commission physician Dr. Thomas Flommerfeldt.

Merv McKenzie, head of the commission, was satisfied because all contracts have been

signed and both fighters have been licensed properly.

Irving Ungerman, Chuvalo's manager, said there are no complications.

"I don't really care about anything right now except that these two fighters are in the ring Tuesday," he said.

Angelo Dundee, who handles managerial duties for the Louisville syndicate sponsoring Clay, was satisfied because terms of the commission contract were agreeable.

Following the medical examination, Dundee and Clay went into McKenzie's office to sign the contract.

**WEIGHTS NOT ANNOUNCED**  
The weights weren't announced. Ted McWhorter, Chuvalo's chief trainer, said his fighter weighed around 212 and plans to come in at 209.

Clay, who weighed 225 when he arrived here Friday, is closing in on his fighting weight of about 215.

McKenzie said he will release a list of rules and regulations two days before the 15-round fight.

"We will use Ontario officials, a referee and two judges," McKenzie said. "And there won't be any squabble about gloves to be used." McKenzie said the gloves are "the problem of the promoter. All we stipulate is that they are eight-ounce gloves and of the same make."

McKenzie was reluctant to comment on whether this would be a title fight, but he said: "Ontario can not recognize this as a championship fight because it falls under the jurisdiction of the WBA."

The WBA recognizes Ernie Terrell of Chicago as its champion. Terrell was originally scheduled to fight Clay but backed out. Clay is generally recognized throughout the world as champion.

**Rangers, Wings To Meet Tonight**

The Wings are three points behind third-place Toronto Maple Leafs with 60 points, while the New Yorkers are in fifth spot, out of playoff contention. However, Toronto has played two games less than the Wings.

First-place Canadiens clash with the Leafs at Montreal Forum Thursday night in the only other mid-week action.

Canadiens, with 80 points, hold a one-point edge over Chicago Black Hawks and also maintain a game in hand over the Hawks.

No matter where they finish in the standings, Sid Abel, Detroit coach and general manager, has already taken steps to ensure a strong goaling situation for the playoffs.

He has dispatched regular netminder Roger Crozier to Florida for a short vacation and has recalled George Gardner from Pittsburgh of the American Hockey League.

Gardner, in the nets for Detroit Sunday night for their 6-1 win over Toronto, is the young-

ster the Red Wings protected instead of Terry Sawchuk in the draft two years ago. Sawchuk wound up with the Maple Leafs.

Toronto and Montreal are easing two defencemen as doubtful starters for their Thursday night meeting, one because of injury and the other because of league discipline.

Kent-Douglas, who picked up a minor penalty, a major, a misconduct and a game misconduct on Saturday night against Chicago Black Hawks in Toronto, still must await further word from league president Clarence Campbell whether or not he will receive a fine, suspension or both for allegedly pushing and throwing a punch at linesman John D'Amico, who stepped in to break up a fight with Chicago's Doug Mohns.
