

LOST PYJAMAS SPOILED TRIP

LONDON (AP) — Bridegroom Anthony Gill has asked in airline to pay him compensation for failing to deliver his pyjamas while he was on honeymoon.

"It was ridiculous and almost spoiled our honeymoon" he said in an interview.

Two weeks ago, Tony married Barbara, a pretty 22-year-old. On the way to London Airport the bridegroom said: "My pyjamas, they're in a suitcase with some other things back at my house."

A friend offered to go get them and ship the bag by air. Gill and his wife left for the island of Majorca.

The friend collected the suitcase and posted it to London Airport.

At the airport in Palma, Majorca, the bride groom waited. The bag with the pyjamas didn't arrive.

HONEYMOON ON RUNWAY

The next day and the following day—still no bag. Hours that the honeymooners should have been spending in the sun they spent at the airport.

Wednesday night, the honeymoon over, Gill retraced and discovered that the package had not been sent because customs officers needed a detailed list of the suitcase's contents.

"I want compensation—and a written apology from the airline," (British European Airways) said Gill.

His wife said: "He managed to buy just about everything he needed in Majorca—except pyjamas."

Probe Promised Of Contracts By Bustamante

KINGSTON (AP) — Sir Alexander Bustamante, returned to power by Jamaican voters to guide their first independent government said here he intends to check up on contracts of the outgoing regime headed by his cousin, Norman Manley.

The 76-year-old leader of the Jamaica Labor Party reported he plans to appoint a panel of lawyers to examine details of the government's undertakings and set to make them void if they are not in the best interest of Jamaica.

Manley will remain prime minister a few days, keeping the office until official results of Tuesday's parliamentary election are received from all 45 constituencies.

Incomplete returns claimed 23 seats, a majority, for Bustamante's Labor party. The People's National Party headed by Manley, which had been favored to win, was assured of only 17 seats.

Of five districts still in doubt, Bustamante's candidates led in three and Manley's in two.

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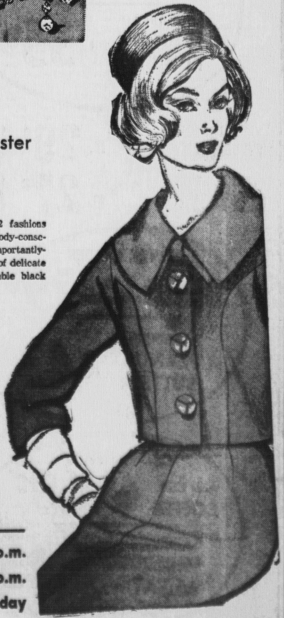
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
