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Liquor Outlets Discussed In Mainland Legislatures

Three provincial legislatures—Alberta, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick—discussed extension of liquor outlets Tuesday with the weight of opinion resting largely with existing liquor laws.

In the Alberta legislature, where debate raged the hottest, a committee report advising against any new outlets, produced sharply opposing view on liquor consumption.

Abel Miller (L—Edmonton), first non-committee member to speak in the debate, said he expected some "guidance" from the committee report "but now I am more confused than ever."

"If liquor is such an evil as it is said to be, then why are we in the liquor business at all?" he asked.

Nick Dushenski (CCF—Willingdon), another committee member, called for a province-wide plebiscite on the question.

PLAN NO CHANGES
The Nova Scotia government doesn't plan any immediate broadening of its liquor control laws, Provincial Secretary G. I. Smith said.

Mr. Smith, who administers liquor control in the province, spoke in reply to a question from Eric W. Balcom (L—Kings North).

In the New Brunswick legislature Opposition Leader J. E. Connolly, who had given notice of a motion calling for appointment of a committee to study all aspects of the liquor situation, asked for postponement. The Liberal leader said he did so at the request of Premier Fleming.

None of the three provinces has provision in existing law for cocktail bars. All have beer sold by the glass in taverns while liquor and wine may be sold in licensed private clubs. Beer, liquor and wine is sold by government stores in the three provinces.

TO INCREASE POLICE
Attorney-General Roberts of Ontario told the legislature the Ontario Provincial Police force will be increased by 200 uniformed men this year and salaries will be increased net month. He said the increase will bring strength to 1,770 uniformed men.

The Manitoba government will spend \$39,000 this year on an aeromagnetic survey of mineral resources in southeastern Manitoba, Mines Minister F. C. Bell announced.

A veteran Liberal opposition member, A. Mindy Lopton (L—Saskatoon) said the Saskatchewan government allowed the promoters of the Saskatchewan Cement Corporation to make a \$2,621,000 profit out of government loans which put the company on its feet.

Provincial Secretary Clarence Fines defended the government's support of the cement company and accused the opposition of trying to keep industry out of the province.

In the British Columbia legislature a new municipal act was introduced by Municipal Affairs Minister Wesley Black. It provides that the minister may direct two or more adjacent municipalities to form a committee to report on inter-municipal matters. Should the committee decide in favor of a metropolitan area Victoria will fix a date for a referendum.

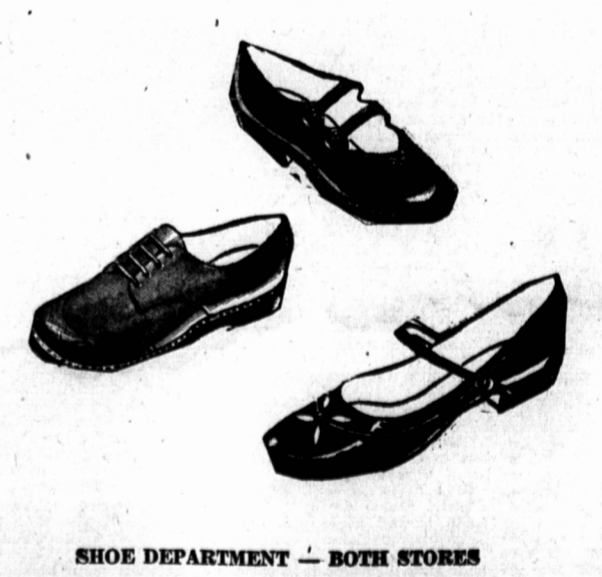
