THE JOSEPHINE in this performance the audience was introduced to a singer new to the stage. Her right royal welcome has decided the question of her success. Easily, quietly, with a sweet voice—aided, of course, by a fascinating personality—she sang her way deep into the sympathies of her audience. In the role of Josephine, Miss Moore had to personate a vigorous character abounding with phases, the delicate interpretation of which is no easy matter for a novice to undertake. That she succeeded hardly needs to be told. Before the end of the first act her ability was recognized, and delighted approval was showered upon her with every burst of applause. The rendition of "Refrain, Andacou, Tar," which introduces a period of mock solemnity in the comedy, was particularly well done. In all Miss Moore's work, the sincerity of expression was apparent, and we congratulate her upon her well-deserved success. The character of Buttercup provides very few occasions for the display of those great talents which we learned to appreciate in Miss Sinclair's impersonation of Olivette, when that opera was played here last year. The part is comparatively void of those opportunities for dramatic achievement which make the part of Josephine more lively. But the Buttercup of last night is the happy possessor of a voice whose every note is a manifestation of high quality, and by her songs she prevented her part from being in the least obscured by the greater prominence that attaches to some of the other characters of the opera. She looked the part and acted it well. Her singing was captivating. Every note came clear and mellow, and even the lowest ones were perfectly audible in all parts of the house. Captain Corcoran's voice is not entitled to take rank with that of the pretty Josephine, nor with that of the beautiful Buttercup. But his physique and bearing, and his hearty robustness appeal for him, and when the gallant captain was given—as was often the case—liberal and enthusiastic applause, not one could be found to deny that he deserved it. Mr. Bremner is an old favorite, and Pinafore, or any other amateur opera performance without him, would seem strange indeed. As well might we expect to have a harmonious orchestra without our two Professors—one at the piano and the other at the first violin. Of Mr. J. Owen's achievement as Ralph it is difficult to speak without seeming to unduly criticize. In this exceeding difficult role he performed his work most conscientiously, but his voice was hardly capable of the efforts required to prevent overshadowing by the finer voices of Josephine and Buttercup. In all other regards Mr. Owen made an ideal Ralph, and his highly commendable acting was heartily applauded. The dignified and courteous Sir Joseph Porter, K. C. B., was represented by Mr. Chas. Leigh, jr., who is to the manner born. He made a most delightful Admiral. Attired in his gorgeous uniform and resplendent from his cocked hat to his buckled shoes, he and his sisters and his cousins and his aunts received unbounded admiration. He is evidently an "Admiral" of the first class, although the uniform looked unfamiliar. Mr. Charles Bell made a notably good boatman, and Mr. Will Gillespie made a sufficiently nice and devoted Dick Deadeye. Miss Lena McDonald capably sustained the character of Hebe. On the singers depend the fate of an opera. Being purely musical works, no amount of acting can atone for the deficiency that will exist if a performer is handicapped in the matter of voice. Making every allowance for amateurs we are forced to admit that some of the soloists were hardly able for the tasks they undertook. The chorus singing was, on the whole, fair. It never reached a height to call for superlative praise. Careful elimination of such objectionable traits as excessive and exaggerated intonation, and the application of a little more attention to the spirit of the words and music, would bring about favorable results. In the chorus from Olivette, introduced during an interval, the superiority was marked. It was rendered with much strength, and formed a striking contrast to the culmination of the "Farewell My Own." One of the cleverest bits of pantomime that we have ever seen in Charlottetown was the fishing scene between Dick Deadeye and Mr. Geo. Rogers, one of the crew. A comic song by the latter made quite a hit. A word about the orchestra. We are glad that there was no hitch, as it was half suggested there would be by a correspondent in THE EXAMINER the other day. With musicians fully capable of understanding their score it would be strange indeed if the time were not strictly followed, and we are glad to say that the orchestral work was undoubtedly good. In the matter of stage setting, scenery, costumes, etc., the committee have had a great deal of work, and their efforts to secure a harmonious completeness deserved the encouraging large audience that filled the Opera House last evening. Mr. Earle, the musical director, and the committee as well, repeat a substantial reward for their indefatigable work, in the large attendance. To the Oddfellows we owe a cordial vote of thanks for providing us, from time to time, with opportunities—which would otherwise be rare—of becoming acquainted with operatic works. If we have ventured to point out one or two weaknesses, it must be remembered that this is the third time Pinafore has been presented by them, and it is generally accepted axiom that "practice makes perfect."

COMPLAINT.—A resident on Kent St. complains that thoroughfare is being made a racetrack, especially during and on Sundays. This nuisance is a source of danger to women and children and our informant says that unless the practice is stopped at once the names of offenders will be given to the police.

PINAFORE NOTES.—A very good picture, representing Charlottetown harbor and the water front of the city, formed the background of the scenery at last night's performance. The work was done by Wm. Whittlock, and is very creditable indeed. The moonlight effect in the second act was produced by electric lights furnished by Manager Waddell of the P. E. Island Electric Company.

STILL THEY COME.—Between January and April nearly 500 persons settled in the lake St. John district of Quebec. Of the 47 families six were from New Hampshire, three from New York, fifteen from Massachusetts, and some from Michigan and Wisconsin. New lands in the province have during the winter months been assigned to nine families from one New Hampshire village, and a like number from a small town in Connecticut.

FUNERAL TO-DAY.—The funeral of the late Master Frederick L. McMillan took place this morning to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where service was held. The body was taken by train to Kensington, thence to be conveyed to the cemetery. The floral offerings were numerous, conspicuous among them being a cross from the League of the Cross, of which the deceased was a member. The mourners who attended the funeral in a city.

CANADA'S CREDIT.—Queensland, one of the Australian Colonies, is trying to float a loan of \$12,000,000 in three and a half per cent bonds at 87 1/2. Canada, a few months ago, disposed of three per cent debentures at a price below par. In other words, Canada got over ten per cent more for her bonds than the Queenslanders expect to get for theirs, and Canada will pay half per cent less in interest than her Australian cousins. The difference in the figures is an indication of the splendid credit which the Dominion enjoys in the London money market.

STARVATION IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—The Rev. E. W. Stone, writing to an upper province paper about the destitution in Newfoundland says: "Some of our people are in a starving condition, one of them having offered his bible for a bite to eat. I found another man standing by my door to-day, and on asking him what he required, his answer was, 'I am starving,' and I found that was the third day that he had no food of any kind in his house. Truly we are in a miserable condition. Poverty amounting to starvation is prevalent. There are about twelve or fourteen families in this district (Norman's Cove) who are in a state of starvation. I appeal to those that the Lord has blessed with plenty to help us in this time of sore need."

NEW STEAM LAUNCH.—Mr. H. H. Crossman, of this city, has about completed a handsome steam launch for Mr. E. W. Dunham, of the Guardian office, and it is expected that it will be all ready for launching by the middle of June. The launch is to be called the "Edith May" and will be used for camping purposes. The launch is 25 feet long, 6 feet beam and three feet deep, and is edge-built of 1 1/2 by 1 inch strip. The engine is 4 horse power. The boiler, which is of the pipe pattern and modified after those used in the navy, is located in the forward part of the craft under the deck, and is covered by about 3 inches of asbestos with imitation cherry and mounted with brass nearly case. It is 4 feet long by 2 feet wide and 2 feet 9 inches deep. The engine is placed in the stern of the steamer and in the space between the boiler and the engine there is accommodation for about twenty-five people. The pump, heater, ejector and pipes are all hidden in the casing of the coal bunkers, of which there are two. There are two tanks, one for cold and the other for condensed water. An ejector is connected with the cold water tank. All exhaust steam will be condensed and carried back into the boiler. The propeller, which has three blades, is 17 inches in diameter with 14 inch pitch, to be driven 499 revolutions a minute. Mr. Crossman made the model and built the hull and engine and boiler, and the workmanlike manner in which every thing has been attended to reflects the greatest credit upon him.

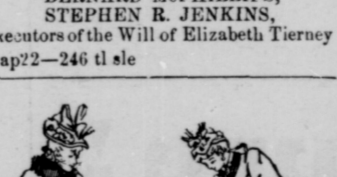
