AN ISLANDER DROWNED.—A telegram from Seattle, Wash., received by Mr. L. E. Frowse this morning, conveys the sad intelligence that Mr. Daniel Stewart, son of Charles Stewart, Esq., of Lot 48, and brother of Mr. Bruce Stewart, former of McKinnon & McLean's foundry, was drowned at that place yesterday. The deceased was well and favorably known in this city having been book-keeper for the Charlottetown Woolen Mills Company for three years. He left for Seattle about a year ago. No particulars of the sad affair have been received.

HE WANTS DAMAGES.—Officer William Weatherhead, of the St. John police force, who was recently dismissed, has served a writ on Chief of Police Clarke, and will enter an action for \$5,000 damages. Weatherhead, as THE EXAMINER has already intimated, was one of the policemen who made the charge of perjury against Capt. Rawlings, and he has been very free in criticizing the chief's administration. When the grand jury found no bill in the Rawlings case the chief lost no time in dismissing Weatherhead, and refuses to give any reason.

A WORD OF PRAISE.—The Pictou News says: The crew of the SS. William which lay opposite the old lock-up where the fatal fire originated, are deserving of the highest praise for the splendid work which they did. In fact, if it had not been for their prompt efforts in getting a stream of water to bear on the fire Pictou might present a much sadder sight than it does. About the first to become aware of the fire, they soon had a stream of water bearing on the building, and kept the fire from spreading in their direction quite a time before the arrival of the fire engine, which had it not been for the checking influence of the William's stream, would not have been able to get to the wharf at all.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21. The exports for the four months ending November, show an increase of half a million dollars over the same period last year, and the imports show a decrease of the same amount for the same period. The excess of exports over imports is six million dollars during the year ending Sept. 30th.

The Government-General exercised the prerogative of mercy in one hundred and fifty-five cases. The New England & Nova Scotia Navigation Company, again give notice of application for an incorporation under the Companies Act. The range lights leading into Cascopec Harbor have been discontinued.

A Statement Denied.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 21. The government denies the statement that the Baptist mission steamer Peace was seized by the Congo State authorities, the British flag hauled down on the vessel and the flag of the Congo State hoisted in its place. It is stated that on account of the wreck of the Congo State steamer that a requisition was made for the Peace, and that the missionaries received an indemnity for the use of the vessel by the Congo officials. Government officials here declare that the object of yesterday's report was to prejudice England against the Congo State on import duties.

Baring Bros. Again.

LONDON, Nov. 21. It is officially announced that arrangements for continuing the business of Baring Bros. & Co. here have been concluded. A limited company has been formed and it will be registered immediately with a subscribed capital exceeding one million pounds. Thomas Baring, member of Parliament, becomes Chairman of the company and devotes the whole of his fortune to the firm's credit. The other directors are Viscount Francis Baring, member of Parliament, John Baring and Hinman Hodgson.

Halifax Notes.

HALIFAX, Nov. 21. The schr. Laura is under arrest for smuggling liquor at Cape Breton some days ago.

A Chinese laundry is to be opened on Duke St. Wah Koo is the proprietor, and he will be assisted by his fellow countryman Yon Won.

The steamer Netherholme arrived from Hamburg to-day with sugar for the Nova Scotia Refinery. Capt. Markham reports having encountered terrific gales, and tremendous seas.

Terrorizing the Country.

PINE RIDGE, S. D., Nov. 21. Indians continue their ghost dances here and the surrounding country is in a state of terror. Yesterday a large band of Indians left Rosebud agency and headed this way. It is possible the dancing Indians may consolidate their forces at Wounded Knee, and in that case a fight may be expected any moment. The wives and children of traders and other whites have departed for safer points.

FORT NIobrARA, Neb., Nov. 21. Troops from this place visited Rosebud Agency early yesterday morning and found all quiet and peaceful.

Russia, which has already a high customs tariff, is going to increase the duties.

A despatch from Buenos Ayres says President Pellegrini intends to resign. It is estimated that there are 100,000,000 people in Europe who do not eat meat more than once a week.

An orange tree in Polk County, Fla., is seven feet in circumference, and has yielded from 25 to 50 boxes of fruit yearly since 1856.

The net revenue of the United States treasury for the last fiscal year were \$403,080,982, an increase over the previous year of over \$16,000,000.

The New York Herald says that the United States is paying twenty-three pensions for the war of the revolution, which closed one hundred and seven years ago. These must be paid to descendants of revolutionary soldiers.

During Mr. Gladstone's stay at Fisque he paid a long visit to the famous Feter Cairn distillery, of which his nephew, Sir John Gladstone, is the principal proprietor. The annual output from this distillery is 80,000 gallons of whiskey.

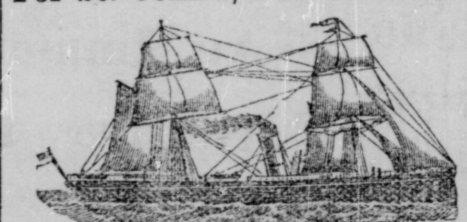
