Fine Piano Concert By Young Maritime Artist

An enjoyable piano concert was given last night under Prince of Wales College auspices in the College auditorium, the artist being Mr. Dale Jackson. A native Maritimer, Mr. Jackson is a graduate of the Mount Allison Conservatory and has won many honours as a musical festival. He is now doing a concert tour of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

Judging by last night's performance this young man is on the eve of a brilliant musical career. He has scintillating technique, a fine sense of timing and a warmth of emotional expression, well disciplined and controlled. Last night's audience was a disappointingly small one, but Mr. Jackson put everything he had into his recital and his hearers were enthusiastic in their appreciation. The programme also calls for a word of praise, both for its variety and for its solid musical content.

An outstanding number was Beethoven's Sonata in C Minor, Opus 13, better known as the Pathetic, the three movements of which were given an impressive performance. This great work is well known to concert goers, but its charm is inexhaustible and it remains an exacting test of ripe musicianship. The beautiful Adagio movement was played exceptionally well, as was the concluding Rondo with its stirring tempo.

Mr. Jackson opened his programme with Cantata by a great composer of an earlier Elizabethan age, Henry Purcell, who excelled both in instrumental and vocal compositions and whose liturgical music is still frequently played. Until recent years, while Byrd and his contemporaries remained forgotten, Purcell was claimed as unquestionably the greatest English composer.

Mr. Jackson has specialized in the study of Debussy and Chopin, and both of these masters were well represented on his programme. From Debussy he played the popular "Clair de Lune," also "Reflets dans l'eau" and a piano Prelude; from Chopin the "Prelude in C Minor," Op. 28, No. 1, and two Preludes from Opus 28 and Etude in C Minor, Op. 10, No. 3. These were given a very fine interpretation, and were followed with particular interest by piano students.

The concluding numbers programmed were "Impromptu," Op. 34, by Gabriel Faure, who died in Paris in 1924 after a long career as a music teacher and composer; "Notturmo," by Otterino Respighi, who in his day was head of the St. Cecilia Conservatorium in Rome; and a Toccata by Khachaturian. A spirited rendition of De Falla's "Fire Music" was given as a final encore number.

It is to be hoped that another opportunity will be presented of hearing Mr. Jackson in Charlottetown, and that music lovers will turn out in much larger numbers on the next occasion. Certainly those who heard him last night will not willingly forego this pleasure.
