

Prime Minister Opens Fine New Raceway At Summerside

Lauding the magnificence of the grounds and grandstand, the Prime Minister of Canada, the Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent, in holiday mood, and from a grandstand box beside the finish wire, yesterday afternoon officially opened the new Summerside Raceway and after the first race presented a trophy to James MacGregor, the winning driver of "Anyway".

Looking relaxed and apparently enjoying the occasion, Mr. St. Laurent in speaking to the large number of people in attendance expressed deepest appreciation to the directors for their courtesy in inviting him to be present. He said that as it was Dominion Day he was taking the day off from electioneering and would make no allusions to the present campaign. "Actions speak louder than words however," the Prime Minister added facetiously, "and the fact that I have J. Watson MacNaught in my side shows that I am interested in more than horse racing here on the island. Horse racing like other sports adds variety to our way of life," he went on.

He said that the island had many fine men and women as well as good horses. "All work and no play makes dull Canadians," he added, "and we don't want to be that, so let us enjoy this 'sport of kings' as perhaps we might call it now 'the sport of queens' or down here in our country 'the sport of princesses' or take great pleasure in sharing this sport with you and now declare this race was officially opened," the Prime Minister concluded.

Prime Minister Welcomed

He was introduced by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, who congratulated the directors on the success of their undertaking. Mayor Wedge welcomed the Prime Minister to Summerside. He also congratulated the directors of the Raceway, saying it was a development of almost importance in the life of the community, the presence of the Prime Minister, he said, "gives the occasion an added interest."

In the Prime Ministers party were the Hon. Robert Winter, Minister of resources and development, Hon. John Duggan, secretary of State, Premier Alexander Macpherson, Mr. P. Watson MacNaught, Liberal nominee for Prince County and Mr. William Currie, president of the P. E. I. Liberal Association.

Stewart MacMillan of the Halifax Wanderers Athletic Club won the six mile road race at the Maritime Invitation Track and Field Meet here last night by covering the distance in 34 minutes, 16 2-5 seconds.

The 30-year-old MacMillan displayed amazing stamina as he finished the last quarter lap with a brilliant burst of speed.

Joe Richard of Saint John, New Brunswick finished a good second to MacMillan, while the ageless John Paul came third and Russell Doyle of the Abegweit Club fourth.

MacMillan also won the six mile race held here a year ago. At that time the race was held on the pavement and he ran the route in a little better than 32 minutes.

Displaying an easy running style and the best of physical condition he went ahead at the beginning of the race and was never threatened. Richard kept pace with him until the last lap but the Halifax runner pulled away to win by half a lap.

Seven runners started in the race but three were forced to drop out before they could run the required 24 laps.

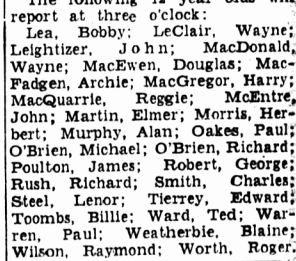
