



### Veteran And Railwayman Dies

The death of Mr. I. Stanley Crosby occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital July 13th, 1957, after a short illness.

Born at Marshfield, P.E.I. the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Crosby, he went to Western Canada when a young man and entered the service of the C.P.R. at Moose Jaw from where he enlisted in the First World War serving with the 10th Field Co. He was severely wounded at Vimy Ridge and was hospitalized for several months.

On his return to Canada he became C.N.R. agent at Otton, Sask. and in 1922 married Lillie Gertrude Pickard of Charlottetown P.E.I. He afterwards served as C.N.R. agent at Hubbard, Ituna, and Semans, Sask.

Retiring in 1951, he and Mrs. Crosby came back to their native Province and took up residence at 103 Euston St., Charlottetown.

He was a member of Melville Lodge A.F. and A.M.

Surviving in addition to his wife is his daughter Betty Jean wife of Donald Kenneth Faurischou of Ottawa.

He is also survived by two nephews John W. Crosby of Meadow Bank, P.E.I. and Dr. Clayton H. Crosby of Regina, Sask., and a niece Mrs. J. Gordon McLean, Prince St., Charlottetown.

### Slight Increase Shown In Canadian Exports In May

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian exports increased slightly in May and in the first five months of 1957, the bureau of statistics said today.

Exports in May rose more than two per cent to \$437,600,000 from \$428,500,000 in the corresponding month a year ago. In the January-May period the value was up three per cent at \$1,900,100,000 from \$1,846,300,000.

Heavier shipments to the United States, the United Kingdom, Latin America and other foreign countries more than offset lower sales to the rest of the Commonwealth and Europe in May. Bigger sales to the U.S., Latin America, Europe and other foreign countries in January-May more than counterbalanced smaller exports to the U.K. and the rest of the Commonwealth.

Exports to the U.S. in May rose to \$260,790,000 from \$256,541,000 and in the January-May period to \$1,267,755,000 from \$1,116,615,000. Sales to the U.K. in May increased to \$68,266,000 from \$58,584,000 but fell to \$282,507,000 from \$303,598,000 in the January-May period.

Shipments to the rest of the Commonwealth dipped to \$22,849,000 in May from \$24,292,000 last year and to \$92,583,000 from \$100,540,000 in the five months. However, sales to Latin American

### Fight Inflation In Old County

LONDON (AP)—Britain is mobilizing her best brains in politics to combat inflation and defend the British pound.

Sharply rising prices—a quickening trend after an upward movement for many months—caused Prime Minister Macmillan's Conservative government grave concern.

Even some Conservative supporters are saying the government cannot survive unless it checks the increases in prices of coal, electricity, gas, transportation, postage, rent, and clothing.

The political and economic thinkers will be brought together next month for consultation with Chancellor of the Exchequer Peter Thorneycroft and members of the national production advisory council on industry. Council members are leaders of the nationalized industries, employers and a representative of the trades union council.

The call for the meeting was made after the council heard a disquieting address Friday by Thorneycroft. The country's economic chief disclosed the government already has taken one important step—raising to six per cent the interest on money loan government units borrow from the national government. This is designed to curb spending by county and other local governments.

Under especially heavy fire are the nationalized industries, which for months have been alternately raising wages, and then boosting the cost of their products and services. Demands for pay increases inevitably spread to private enterprises, with a general spiralling effect unaccompanied by increased production.

The 8,000,000-strong Trade Union Congress has refused to give advance pledges of wage restraints without government action to stop the rise in prices.

Wage increases, without corresponding improvement in production and efficiency, were cited by Thorneycroft as a major cause of the inflation in his appearance before the production council.

These recent events are evidence of what is happening. Police Chief Rosaire Boisclair, who has just moved his wife and five sons here from Val D'Or, reminded car drivers the speed limit is 20 miles an hour. Speeding fines of \$18.50 and illegal parking fines of \$2 will be imposed, he said.

Chibougamau, due to have a railway connection with the outside world in the next few months, has just got its first telegraph service.

A trucking company announced a 40-hour express service from

Montreal, 400 miles away, by way of Quebec and the Saguenay region.

Town officials signed a new contract with Quebec-Hydro to increase Chibougamau's power supply by 150 per cent.

Provincial police seized two pin-ball machines in town restaurants.

Torrential rains caused postponement of a service club field day and La Sentinelle, the weekly newspaper, reported a citizen who bought 150 feet of garden hose last year and used it once upon a time to do much better this summer.

Plans were made for a \$350,000 16-class school and city fathers discussed putting up street signs and controlling the parking of trailers some residents live in.

A rooming-house owner complained of weekend noise in a nearby dance hall. The dance hall operators were told to cut off business at midnight Saturdays and let neighbors get a good night's rest.
