A CABLEGRAM states that thirty head of cattle exported by Mr. Smith, of Toronto, were sold at the Liverpool Christmas sale on the 15th inst. They realized an average of upwards of \$30 per head and were admitted to be the finest on the market, even surpassing the British cattle offered.

FINE GOLD BAR.—Mr. G. H. Shattuck brought into Halifax on Wednesday another bar of gold weighing 188 ounces from sixty-three tons of quartz, being the result of three weeks work, at the Galliard Gold Mining and Milling Company's mines. It can be seen at the office of W. L. Low-ll & Co.

It has just been made public that the Quebec province five per cent. \$4,200,000 loan, supposed to have been floated in Paris, two years ago, was replaced by the cunning Frenchmen in London at 4 1/2 per cent., and they thus get half per cent. commission annually, which beside their original commission, etc., netted them some \$200,000.

REV. T. B. FULLER, Bishop of Niagara, died in Hamilton, Ont., on Tuesday morning last. Several days ago he was working in his library when he ran a three cornered file into his hand. At first the wound did not give him much trouble, but a day or two afterwards it festered and blood poisoning set in. Bishop Fuller was 53 years old.

It is stated that, in order to get the benefit of the low rate of postage in the United States, Canadian merchants and manufacturers sent their letters in large bundles by express to the nearest post office on the other side of the line, where they are mailed at the two-cent letter rate, whereas they would have to pay three cents if mailed in Canada, thus effecting a saving of 3 1/2 per cent.

CORRECTION.—In our issue of the 17th inst. we copied from the Summerside Pioneer a paragraph headed "Islanders Abroad," which we find is altogether erroneous. The McLeod mentioned is Duncan M. The tree and fancy tables were well patronised, and a very large number took tea and refreshments. At No 1 fancy table, over fifty dollars were realized, while No 2 made close on forty dollars. A large number of fancy articles remain on both. The Christmas tree produced about twenty dollars, and the tea and refreshment tables close on one hundred. The total proceeds of last night from fancy tables, tea, door money, lotteries, etc., amount to nearly three hundred dollars. The fancy sale will continue to-day, and a tea will be served at six o'clock. All articles remaining at 7.30. will be sold at auction, and the affair will be concluded by an entertainment in the upper music hall of the institution. Admission to the tree and fancy sale will be free, but to the entertainment an admission of twenty cents will be charged.
