GOOD MEN AND TRUE

Opposition Candidates in the Field.

PATON AND JENKINS

Chosen at The Meeting in The Lyceum Last Night.

A CLEAN ELECTION DEMANDED.

There was a large attendance at the meeting in the Lyceum last night, and much enthusiasm was manifested.

The meeting was called to order by Mr S W Crabbe, convener, who explained that they had met to nominate two candidates for Charlottetown and Royalty in opposition to the Farquharson government, and asked that a chairman and secretary be appointed.

Dr R Macneill was then elected chairman and Mr Charles R Smallwood secretary.

The chairman, in declaring the meeting open, emphasised the importance of selecting good men, men who would contribute towards the rooting out of the incapables who have plunged the country so deeply into debt. He suggested that a nominating committee be appointed.

The suggestion was acted upon and a committee was chosen consisting of James Paton, Fredk Perkins, W E Dawson, W H Aitken, S W Crabbe, P Blake, R B Norton, P S Brown, P Cullen and J J Johnston.

While the committee were deliberating the meeting was addressed by Mr. Joseph Wise, Mr. A. A. McLean, Mr. P. McCourt, Mr. T. A. McLean, Mr. J. T. Mellish, Mr. W. S. Stewart, Mr. J. P. Tanton, Mr. E. T. Carboneil, and Mr. A. Des-Roche in the order in which their names are given.

The different speakers dwelt upon the importance of selecting the best men to contest the city and assist the country in hurling from power the combination that has mismanaged affairs and fastened a millstone of debt about the necks of the people. The reports from the country districts were most encouraging, and the prospects are bright for the overthrow of the Farquharson Administration. The great heart of the country is Conservative as evidenced by the fact that in the face of the money and liquor used by the Liberals during the late campaign, three candidates had been chosen in opposition to the Government.

Mr. Stewart, in thanking those who had supported him in the recent contest, referred to some of

the disreputable means used to defeat him in West Queen's, charging bribery and corruption of the largest character.

Mr. W. H. Aitken submitted the report of the nominating committee showing that they had selected Mr. James Paton for Councilman and Dr. S. R. Jenkins for Assemblyman. The announcement was received with cheers and applause, and the report of the committee was adopted by a standing vote.

Mr. Aitken in submitting the report of the nominating committee, expressed his approval of the choice of candidates, and said he would do everything in his power to promote the election of Messrs. Paton and Jenkins. He deprecated corruption at election times, and hoped that the present contest would be free from this great vice. (Applause.)

Mr. Paton, in returning thanks for the honor done him, said he felt it to be his duty to come forward again. He thought that, all the circumstances considered, he did well at the last contest. He wished this to be a pure election. (Applause.) He did not want a vote that had to be bought. (Applause.) He believed that there were enough men obtainable without being bought to place himself and colleague at the head of the poll on election day. (Applause and cheers.)

Dr. Jenkins also spoke of the honor done him, and said that if elected he would do his best to look after the interests of the people. He agreed with what had been said by his colleague with regard to the manner in which the campaign was to be conducted. He wished the election to be free from corruption of every description. (Applause.) He thought it was high time the people made an effort to frown down the corrupt acts employed by the Liberals at elections here. (Applause and cheers.)

Mr. P. Blake expressed his appreciation of the selection that had been made. He also approved of the decision to run the election on pure lines. (Applause.) The people should be sick of the corrupt tactics employed by the enemy. (Hear, hear.) He believed that the people were tired of the corrupt and incapable government they now have. In Charlottetown it was expected that good men would be chosen to oppose the government, and he believed that good men had been selected. (Applause.) If Messrs Paton and Jenkins are elected the people will be proud of them. (Applause.) He urged all to unite and get to work at once. If they did this, as he felt sure they would, the return of the two men nominated tonight was assured. (Applause.)

A vote of thanks was then tendered the chairman and fittingly acknowledged, and the meeting dispersed after giving rousing cheers for the candidates, Messrs Paton and Jenkins.
