**Santana Outlasts Fletcher  
 Drysdale Upsets Aussie**

LONDON (CP)—Manuel Santana, darling of the Spanish tennis aficionados, and South Africa's Cliff Drysdale Tuesday reached the semi-finals of the Wimbledon men's singles and braced themselves for the attack on the 11-year stranglehold Australians and Americans have had on the world's premier tennis title.

Santana, the reigning U.S. champion and seeded fourth here, defeated Ken Fletcher, the happy-go-lucky, globe-trotting Australian, in a 6-2, 3-6, 6-6, 4-6, 7-5 thriller, the best singles match of the tournament so far.

Drysdale, seeded seventh and a losing semifinalist last year, was the surprise winner, 8-7, 6-2, 6-2, against Tony Roche, the left-handed Australian who won the French and Italian titles earlier this year.

In the semi-finals today, Santana plays Owen Davidson, the unseeded Australian who beat Roy Emerson Monday after the defending champion injured his shoulder in a fall, and Drysdale plays Dennis Ralston of the United States, the sixth seed and the other losing semifinalist last year.

Tuesday, he needed all his artistry in the two-hour 15-minute match that see-sawed as the packed centre court gasped and cheered.

In the battle between the Spaniard's spin, slice and subtlety and Fletcher's power, Santana kept his nerve and it was eventually the Australian, who now lives in Hong Kong, who cracked in the tense atmosphere of the final set.

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By contrast, the Roche-Drysdale quarter-final was an anticlimax. Roche, seeded No. 2 here, had been expected to meet Emerson in the final, but Tuesday he folded after starting well and narrowly losing the first set, 7-9.

Defending champion Margaret Smith of Australia and her great Brazilian rival, Maria Bueno, both moved into the women's singles semi-final round in quarter-final matches Tuesday.

Top-seeded Miss Smith was never extended by her unseeded Dutch opponent, 20-year-old Trudy Goeman, and won 6-0, 6-4.

But Miss Bueno, the No. 2 seed, did not show quite the seemingly confidence which won her the Wimbledon crown on three previous occasions. Nevertheless, she was still too strong for auburn-haired Francoise Durr, seventh seeded, and won 6-4, 6-3 in 40 minutes.

Mrs. Billie Jean Moffitt King of the United States gained the semi-finals by beating South Africa's Annette van Zyl, 1-6, 6-2, 6-4 in a poor contest with both players making many mistakes and waiting for the other

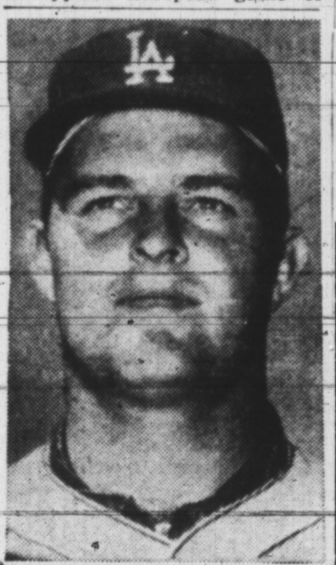
