

Serious Criticism Regarding Canada's Air Defence Plan

Canadian Press Staff Writer - OTTAWA (CP) - Printed testimony given to a United States Senate armed forces committee makes sober reading for Canadians.

In fact, the transcript of the committee's deliberations, just made available here, has more to say about capabilities of the Canadian air defence system than has been given in the Canadian government's recent white paper on defence or by Defence Minister Campney in the Commons.

Chief witness before the U.S. Senate committee was Gen. Earle E. Partridge, commander of the U.S. air defence system.

He said of the RCAF's CF-100 jet interceptor, Canada's main defence weapon: "It is very good for their (Canadian) purposes in that it has long range. The only difficulty is that the aircraft is of post-war design and it is quite slow. It is as slow as the aircraft which we have in our inventory at the present time."

CAN'T GO HIGH ENOUGH

Gen. Partridge went on to say that American interceptors now in squadron service can't fly high enough to attack jet bombers which the Russians have in operation.

In 1957, 1958 and early 1959, the air defence system would not be in "too good shape."

Gen. Partridge also said Can-

ada and the U.S. need better radar equipment. At present, the radar was not efficient in detecting planes at high or low altitudes though it performed fairly well at intermediate heights. It was not expected that complete radar coverage would be available over southern Canada and all the U.S. until 1961.

The two main early warning radar lines are located in Canada—the DEW line in the Arctic and the Mid-Canada fence along the 55th parallel. Most of the Pinecre radar chain is located in southern Canada. It controls the operations of the interceptors.

AUTOMATIC RADAR

The U.S. Air Force soon will begin to put into operation a control system known as SAGE. The letter stand for semi-automatic ground environment.

SAGE designed to increase capability of the U.S. air defence system five to 10 times, will reduce to automation practically every essential step in the air defence process. A radar scope, for instance, will be scanned by another tube which will extract the necessary data and send it automatically to a control centre.

Gen. Partridge said: "He thought the SAGE system has been programmed to cover only the continental U.S. We believe, it essential that Canada one day have some general type as SAGE for have some equipment of the control purposes."

Gen. Partridge also said Can-

(No official report has ever been made by the Canadian defence department on probable Russian bombers, on efficiency of the radar equipment or on the need for more electronic control such as would be provided by SAGE.)

Gen. Partridge told the committee the Russians have enough bombers to launch an initial attack on North America employing hundreds of bombers. Fifty thermonuclear bombs on target would destroy 60 per cent of U.S. industry, 40 per cent of the population.

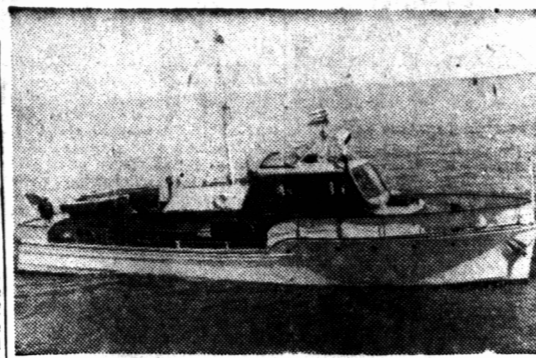
Even after the U.S. air defence command received new missiles and new fighters, "I believe we must be prepared to accept severe damage if the enemy does attack."

Gen. Partridge indicated the U.S. Air Force wants to assume control for the entire North American air defence system, including the RCAF's air defence command.

The Canadian defence department objected to one overall commander for the air defence system because this would place Canadian defence units under an American command.

Gen. Partridge and Canada's Air Vice-Marshal Larry Wray now work very closely together.

Tyne Valley Sees Annual Meeting Of Mem. Health Centre

The Annual Meeting of the Stewart Memorial Health Centre was held in Tyne Valley Hall on Monday evening, June 18th. The President Mr. R.H. Found presided. The report of the activities in the Health Centre was given by Mr. Found.

During the nine months period from March 31st to Dec. 31st there were 67 newborns (an increase of seventeen over 1955). 395 patients received care (an increase of ninety-eight over 1955). 128 out-patients were treated (an increase of thirty-nine over 1955).

Three new pieces of equipment were added during the year. A Croupette and an incubator made available through a welfare grant by the department of Health, and an Ether-suction Anesthetic Machine. An x-ray machine will be installed within the next three weeks.

Mr. Found paid tribute to the excellent work of the Matron and her staff, also our resident Doctor. All felt that the efficiency of this group, along with the splendid cooperation of the Ladies Aid is responsible for the success of the Centre.

The financial report was given by Mr. Lloyd Darrach. The revenue for the year amounted to \$14,072.33 while the expenditure amounted to \$14,856.73 leaving a net operating loss of \$784.40. Income from the Tyne Valley and other functions amounted to \$1,697.74, leaving a profit of \$913.34.

Mr. Darrach pointed out that this report looks good on paper but of the Hospital revenue, a considerable portion is outstanding. The amount outstanding (that

is about due the Hospital) is about \$8,600. Mr. Darrach emphasized the necessity of patients trying to wipe this account off. He urged the people to pay something every month, even if it were only a dollar. If all did that it would relieve the financial embarrassment in which the Directors sometimes find themselves.

The report of the Ladies Aid was given by Mrs. Stewart. The report indicated a very successful year. Much credit is due the Ladies Aid for their co-operation in assisting to maintain the Institution.

Dr. Robinson reported on behalf of the Medical Staff. He thanked the people for the splendid way in which they supported the Health Centre and patronized his office. He also wished to thank the Medical Staff of the Prince County Hospital for their fine co-operation. He stated that the Doctors were always ready to give him hand and upon calling anyone of them. They were practically there before he was ready for them.
