Archie Moore Agreed On Terms

DETROIT AP—Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, agreed Tuesday on contract terms for a title defence against Chuck Spieser of Detroit in January.

Joe Spieser, brother and manager of the Detroit fighter, posted a \$10,000 certified cheque in a brief ceremony in the offices of the Michigan athletic board of control. The remaining \$90,000 of Moore's guarantee must be posted with the commission by Oct. 23.

Abel Kotzen of the board of control said the commission received a telegram from Moore Tuesday accepting the \$100,000 offer for the fight. Spieser's share of the gate has not been determined yet, but it will figure on what is left after Moore's \$100,000 guarantee is paid. Promoters expressed hopes that they will realize \$170,000 at the gate. Spieser was rated a top contender for Moore's crown until the Detroit fighter was knocked out by Tony Anthony in his last fight. Anthony was kayded by Moore in a title fight several years ago.

TOKYO Reuters) — Canadian Ambassador William Frederick Bull said Friday the Japan-Canada trade agreement signed in January, 1954, is working "very smoothly." Bull, speaking at a Japan-Canada Society luncheon, said that in 1956 Canada bought \$4,500,000 worth of Japanese goods and sold Japan \$21,000,000 worth. Last year the amounts had risen to \$61,100,000 and \$128,000,000 respectively.

Vacations With Pay In Federal Labour Field

OTTAWA CP)—Legislation for compulsory vacations with pay for workers under federal jurisdiction will be introduced by the government at this session of Parliament, it was announced Monday in the speech from the throne.

The legislation, it was learned later, will provide two weeks' paid holidays annually for employees with two years' service and one week up to that time. The bill will make it compulsory on employers to pay for the holidays.

It will apply to some 450,000 workers in such industries as railways, shipping and communications whose labor relations are in the federal field. Most of these already have obtained paid holidays through collective bargaining.

With passage of the legislation, the federal government will join seven provinces that have varying forms of legislation ensuring holidays paid by employers.

These are New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

Will Seek New Fish Markets

OTTAWA (CP) — Federal attempts to promote fish markets and develop international rules to protect the fishery were promised Monday in the speech from the throne.

Without going into detail, the speech said: "My government will strive to secure additional markets for the products of our fisheries and to promote the development of international rules to safeguard the living resources of the sea."

The reference to international rules evidently was to dissatisfaction among Atlantic fishermen over the issue. As a conservation measure, the Canadian government has kept Canadian trawlers from fishing within the 12-mile limit while foreign vessels under international law may fish up to within three miles of the coast.

John Diefenbaker promised action to remedy the situation while campaigning for the prime ministry in Nova Scotia last summer.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Rangers move into Madison Square Garden Wednesday night for their 32nd National Hockey League home ice opener with coach Phil Watson optimistic over his team's chances in the championship race. The Rangers, who reached the playoffs in both of Watson's first two seasons at the helm, have played three games on the road and come home with a 3-0 record.
