A Defaulter's Ending. BOSTON, Aug. 19.

S. R. Payzen has failed with liabilities of \$350,000. He was a heavy endorser of Gray's (the defaulting treasurer of the Atlantic Cotton Mills) paper. Payzen, who was President of the City Bank and director in many of the leading companies, was estimated to be worth \$3,000,000, and his failure caused a marked effect in monetary circles. It is rumored that Gray forged Payzen's name, thus involving the latter in obligations to a large amount. Gray's dead body has been found, he having committed suicide by shooting.

To Investigate the Seizure. PORT HAWKESBURY, C. B., Aug. 19.

United States Consul-General Phelan will arrive here in a few days to investigate the matter of the seizure of the American schooner Holbrook for landing a passenger and failing to report at the Custom House when on a fishing trip some three weeks ago. The Holbrook was released at the time upon making a deposit of \$400 to cover amount of her fine.

Andrew Sloan, a wealthy farmer of Bradford, Ont., was found dying in his barn on the night of the 16th, his skull having been crushed in by a blow from a heavy instrument. He lived about a couple of hours. Alfred Kelly, his hired man, has been arrested on suspicion.

James Brown, a blind peddler, suddenly disappeared from here on the 7th inst. Yesterday his dead body was found. He had walked over a cliff in the woods into a small lake and been drowned.

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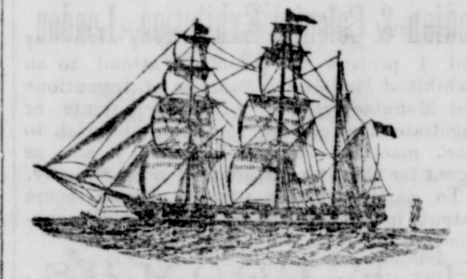
