

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

PRAGUE, Dec. 5. The trial of fifty Socialists was begun here yesterday.

LONDON, Dec. 5. The graver symptoms in case of Postmaster General Fawcett have abated.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 5. The official Gazette says the Czar has assumed the title of Lord of Turkestan.

PARIS, Dec. 5. The France states that Herbert Bismarck has been appointed attaché to the German Embassy here.

LONDON, Dec. 5. The Telegraph says it is rumored that the Bishop of Manchester will succeed the Archbishop of Canterbury.

LONDON, Dec. 5. The Times' Cairo correspondent telegraphs a letter from Arabi, thanking England for her interposition in his behalf.

ODESSA, Dec. 5. Solomon Hacker, a distributor of revolutionary pamphlets, has been sentenced to ten years' labor in the mines.

CAIRO, Dec. 5. The Khedive has been informed that the English Government recommends General Sir Evelyn Wood for the command of the new Egyptian army.

MADRID, Dec. 5. In Ministerial circles the election of Senor Herrera is considered a brilliant victory. His majority was greater than expected.

BERLIN, Dec. 5. The freezing of the waters which have inundated the Rhine country have intensified the devastation and suffering.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5. The banquet proposed to Patrick Egan has been postponed in consequence of the Government's proceeding against Davitt and other members of the Irish party.

MADRID, Dec. 5. "El Correo," states that the Sultan of Morocco has authorized Spain to annex the port of Santa Cruz, del mar Pequena, on the coast of Morocco in accordance with the treaty of 1860.

LONDON, Dec. 5. The Daily News' Alexandria correspondent says: "A native demonstration in honor of Arabi took place here yesterday in the street where the massacre of June 11th commenced."

MOBERLY, Mo., Dec. 5. In a running fight here yesterday in the streets from the attempt by Marshal Lynch to capture John, Nicholas and Richard Cook over a hundred shots were fired, the citizens joining in the chase after the Cooks who are well known desperadoes. Richard was killed, and the other two badly wounded. They will be sent to Mount Sterling where they are wanted for various crimes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. Both houses of congress were convened to-day and received a message which, in opening, reviewed our relations with foreign Governments. Great Britain has shown a disposition to respect our rights by the release of arrested parties. Referring to the past Government of the peace congress, which was to assemble in November, 1882, the president trusts the time is nigh when international differences shall be settled without resort to arms. He renews his recommendation for such legislation as will place the United States in harmony with other nations. The total ordinary receipts of the Government for the year ending June 30th, have been \$40,352,525, total auxiliary expenditures, \$257,881,439.58; leaving a surplus revenue of \$145,543,810.71; which with amount drawn for the cash balance in the treasury of \$20,737,694.84, making \$166,281,505.55; total redemption of bonds, \$166,281,505.55. The foreign commerce of the United States during the last fiscal year, including imports and exports of merchandise and specie, was as follows: Exports of merchandise, \$750,542,257; specie, \$49,617,479; total, \$799,979,733. Imports of merchandise, \$724,639,574; specie, \$42,472,490; total, \$767,111,964.

He is encouraged to believe that the evil at which the polygamy laws are aimed may be suppressed without resort to such radical measures as in some quarters have been thought indispensable for success. The attention of Congress is invited to the necessity of additional legislation to secure the preservation of the valuable forests still remaining on the public domain, especially in the extreme Western States and Territories. Considering the question of such service he says: "I trust that before the close of the present session some decisive action may be taken for the correction of the evils which enure the present method of appointment."

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. The New York papers generally comment upon President Arthur's message, and the Herald says: "If the Republican Congressmen have learned wisdom from the defeat they will now take this present message as their text-book, and conform their action to every one of its several wise and useful recommendations."

The Tribune says: "If the President shall conduct the remainder of his administration in accordance with the sentiments in his message, he may yet unite his party, and thus secure for himself a greater success than his ambition now pictures to him."

PARIS, Dec. 5. The cruiser "Flore," has been ordered to prepare to proceed to Madagascar. The trial of M. Bontaux, president, and M. Feder, manager of the Union Generale, which suspended last January, commenced to-day.

LONDON, Dec. 5. The British steamer "Strathmore," from Savannah for Bremen, is ashore at Calandsoy, Netherlands. She has jettisoned part of her cargo. Assistance has been sent.

Postmaster-General Fawcett's condition occasions great anxiety. Anthony Trollope is much worse. He is unconscious to-night, and but faint hopes of his recovery are entertained. A home rule demonstration was held at Salford last evening. Among those present were O'Donnell and Kenny, members of Parliament. A resolution passed condemning the Government for its determination to prosecute Davitt and Healy and congress-

lating these true patriots on their refusal to enter into terms for bail.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 6. The "Peruvian" was cut down to the water's edge amidstships. The weather was thick at the time of the collision. Tugs landed the crew and passengers here. Hopes are entertained that the breach can be repaired and the vessel floated in a few tides. The vessel with which the "Peruvian" collided is a steamer of the Clan Line.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 5. A building occupied by a number of cotton and woolen yarn manufacturers, corner Coral and Staylor streets, was burned to-night. Total loss, \$130,000.
