

# Colonial Secretary Sure Diaries Were Terrorist's

LONDON (Reuters) — Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd told Parliament Friday that captured Cypriot terrorist documents are "beyond doubt" diaries written by the terrorist chief Col. George Grivas.

The government has alleged that the diaries identify Archbishop Makarios, exiled leader of the Cyprus union with Greece movement, with active terrorism in the troubled British colony.

Flaying the government for its Cyprus policies, Labor member Aneurin Bevan branded Lennox-Boyd's methods as "fascist."

Bevan denounced the colonial secretary for refusing to bring Makarios to trial if he suspected him of terrorism, during Parliamentary debate on Cyprus. The house later ended its three-day

emergency session and adjourned to Oct. 23.

**DIARIES QUESTIONED**

Phillips Noel-Baker, former Labor secretary of state for Commonwealth relations who opened the debate, questioned the authenticity of the diaries.

Noel-Baker said the diaries are an "amazing product" — 250,000 words—for a guerrilla leader in the hills to write.

"Anybody who writes knows what 250,000 words mean," he said.

Lennox-Boyd replied that the diaries were part of documents running into 250,000 words.

The colonial secretary pointed to evidence which, he said, proved the diaries were written by Grivas. They were found alongside

the terrorist chief's personal belongings, he said.

**SCIENTIFIC TEST**

"But to put it beyond doubt, and as we possess samples of his handwriting, I had the diaries subjected to a scientific examination by Dr. Wilson Harrison, director of the home office forensic science laboratory, which specializes in the examination of documents," Lennox-Boyd declared.

"His report has satisfied me as written by Grivas," he added.

# 3 Federal Departments Now In New Building

Three Federal Government departments have now transferred their office equipment and records to the new Confederation Building and will be doing business at the new stand as from today. The National Employment office headed the movement by commencing its move on Thursday. By Friday evening the change-over was complete, except for the installation of telephones and a switchboard, and this work was carried out on Saturday.

On Friday the Income Tax people and the Dominion Public Works department were on the move. The former was vacating its second floor premises in the old Post Office Building, and the Public Works was giving up its former third floor offices, on Lower Great George street. The Income Tax department has ground floor offices in the Confederation Building thus ending the long stair climb for its clients in the old building. The old stairways were quite a task for taxpayers.

The Public Works department will occupy the top floor of the Confederation Building, and from the new office one of the finest possible views of Charlottetown harbour, the East and West rivers and much surrounding country, is obtainable. Though located six floors up, this will prove no handicap to people having business with the Department. The elevator service will do away with all stair climbing.

Mr. Clive Currie, District Engineer for Public Works in Prince Edward Island said yesterday, that his move was about three quarters completed, with one branch of his department presently located on the Marine wharf, still to be transferred.

Mr. L. W. Goodwin, Collector of Customs, expects to make the shift from the old Post Office Building to the Confederation Building today. The Customs Department will recommence business on the third floor of the new building.

The Department of Veterans Affairs is not expected to move until some time in midweek or later, and the Post Office staff will likewise not make the change for several days. The former Department has a very fine new set-up on the fourth floor of the modern new building thoroughly equipped to give service the Island's many veterans.

Most of the ground floor and part of the basement has been allotted to the biggest department operated by the Federal Government in this City, the Post Office. Nothing definite has been announced by the Fisheries Department, but it is known that the offices now occupied in the Sterns Laundry building must be vacated before September 15th, the date on which the lease expires. The Fisheries people are expected to move well before that dead line date.
