NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The statement is made in a reliable quarter that more than 120,000 men and 3,650 officers of the German army have responded to the call for volunteers for Chinese service.

Japan's action in the China crisis is the theme of general comment and praise. Japan's attitude elicits all the more praise because of her unpleasant experience with the powers, following her victories in the late Chinese war.

A despatch to the London Daily Telegraph from Chefo, dated July 31, says it transpires that when the Chinese made a determined rush on the British Legation in Pekin, Capt. Meyers, of the American marines, displayed a conspicuous courage. Under a heavy fire he led his men in a sortie, drove the enemy back, and captured several hundred rifles and a quantity of ammunition. He was wounded. Dr Sippet was severely wounded.

Hugh John McDonold is after Mr. Sifton because of the frauds in the sale of school lands in Manitoba. Mr. Sifton had the lands sold at auction. Men in the ring bid them up high, and had them knocked down to them, thus shutting out the bona fide purchaser. Next day the bidders would fail to turn up, and the lands would be sold at the upset price to other members of the ring, who were ready to dispose of them at a higher figure to the regular settler. It is another case of the "go-between." Mr. McDonold has the right to interfere in a matter of this kind, because the revenue from school lands belongs to the province. When the bona fide settler pays a high figure to a speculator, who gets the land cheap, the province is robbed. The "go-between" trick, which is characteristic of the Ottawa transactions, must be stopped.

Ottawa Journal: Haul down the flag Jones of Halifax is 'dow to be the legal custodian of the flag down there. If old Kruger had not waited so many years to start the row in South Africa, betting wouldn't be so bad that he would live to be lieutenant-governor of whatever they intend to call the Transvaal.

Montreal Gazette: When the British commissioner to the Paris exhibition made some suggestions as to the Canadian department, Mr. Tarte affronted him to his face and insisted on something else. When Mr. Picard, the French commissioner sent round word that the Canadian department was to be open on Sunday, though the Canadian Parliament desired otherwise, open flew the doors.

Le Journal: Reliable information makes it our duty to recommend our friends to be on their guard, and not to trust to the comings and goings of the ministers to calculate the date of the elections. We may have them sooner than later. We know that the Government has made arrangements to dissolve Parliament at any moment. There is, besides in Europe, a Minister, a great talker, as everyone knows, whose acts at this moment corroborates what we are aware of in any case. Let us be ready then.

ISLANDER'S NARROW ESCAPE.

Murray MacNeill, of Denver, Struck Twice by Lightning.

Mr Murray MacNeill, an Islander living in Denver Col, and in the employ of the Colorado Telephone Company narrowly missed death by electricity recently. He had been stringing wires for the company on some of the mountain peaks, and while clinging to a pole was severely burned in the side by a current of lightning, which struck the wires some distance away and ricocheted toward him, finally landing in his side and going thence to the ground. MacNeill intuitively avoided the current and therefore received only a portion of it. Some time after he was again stringing wires when another current came running along the wires and knocked him senseless, causing him to fall from the pole, thirty feet, and to break three ribs on the right side of his body. He was discovered an hour later and removed to a neighboring ranch. When in Denver, MacNeill lives with his sister, Mrs. George McSwain, at Moncrieff place and Homer Boulevard.

Mr MacNeill has recovered from his severe treatment, and is again living in Denver. He is the youngest son of the late Laughlan MacNeill, of Tryon. This experience seems to disprove the assertion that lightning never strikes twice in the same place.
