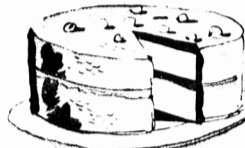

**Notes Marked Progress In Fishing Industry At Souris**

"I am of the opinion there is plenty of room for development in Prince Edward Island, particularly in the Eastern end of the Province where the great improvement in the facilities at Souris wharf has enabled twenty druggers to tie up in safety on the northern berth at one time," stated Mr. J. Brenton St. John, Liberal member from First Kings, in moving the reply to the Speech from the Throne in the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

Mr. St. John pointed out that the improvements at the Souris wharf along with the natural bounty of fish in that area had resulted in the building of a new filleting plant at Souris in addition to the one already in operation.

"That filleting plant now operating put up over fifty-eight hundredweight of fish for fillets and manufactured over five hundred and fifty tons of fish meal last year," he said. "We had eight druggers fishing out of Souris with at least one landing from twenty other druggers last year. We have another industry starting in Souris that along with the fish plants should give work to people of that town and surrounding districts, and that is the new potato chip factory. This is a new plant being tried out and I hope it will have good success. It has great possibilities as the market in the Maritimes alone for this product has just been touched," continued Mr. St. John.

**Suggests Short Course**

The member from First Kings also suggested the establishing of a short course in navigation and instrument training for at least the captains of all fishing druggers. He pointed out that new instruments can be used to locate schools of fish and can even determine the kind.

Mr. St. John went on to suggest that a seaweed processing plant might be established on the

**To Begin Ramps At New Montague Bridge Today**

"Construction of ramps at either end of the new Montague bridge is scheduled to get underway today, with two loads of the required materials having arrived yesterday and the remainder to arrive today. With good weather prevailing it will be only a matter of several days before motor traffic will be using the new bridge.

It is needless to say that this will be most appreciated by the motorists who are now passing over the approaches to the temporary bridge, which at present are in such a condition that they present a grave hazard to vehicles. High bumps and deep holes are not deemed for the good of a car, and all cars, including the occupants, are taking a considerable shaking up while passing over these washboard approaches.

However, this serious condition was to be expected at this time of the year since the bridge was only a temporary measure, and has served adequately and well since

its opening. Yet, at the present time, because of the condition of the approaches, it is preferable to use another route if such is available, even if for only a short period so that those approaches may dry up and be levelled to permit easier passage. The ramping of the new bridge will eliminate this difficulty, but as may be understood, only until such passage is easier so that the construction of the permanent approaches to the new bridge may be undertaken at the earliest possible moment to ensure their completion before this fall. As a consequence it is expected that the tenders will be called and let in the near future so that the work of permanent structure may get underway.

During that time, however, motorists will greatly appreciate the use of the new bridge until such time as it will be found expedient to divert traffic once more across the temporary bridge.

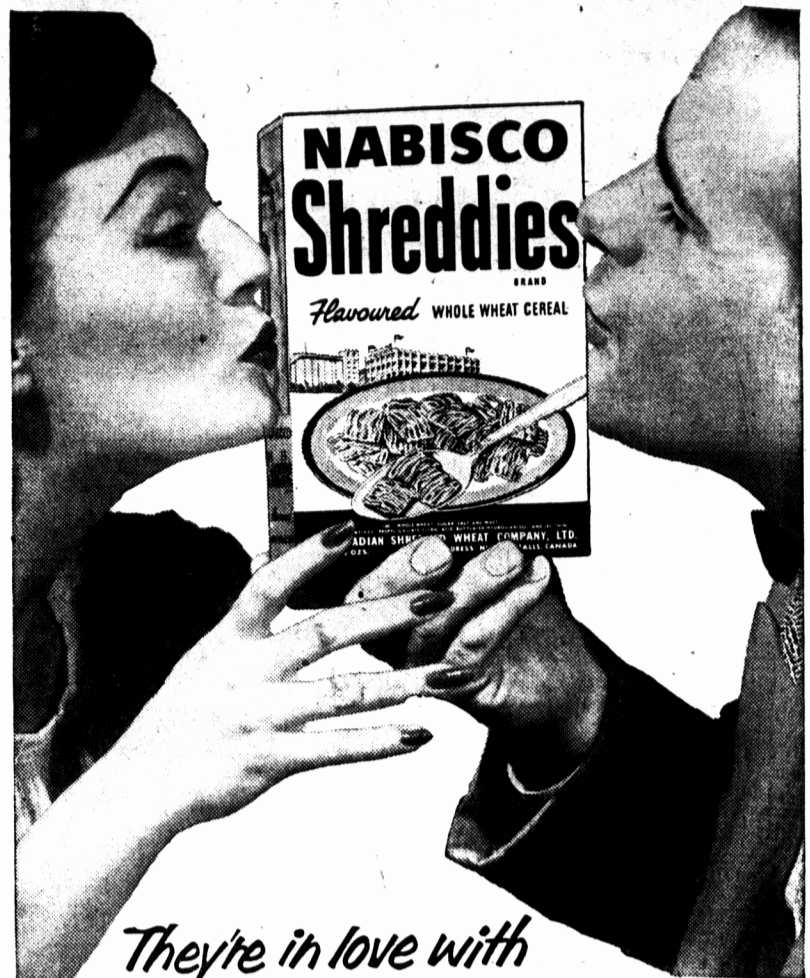

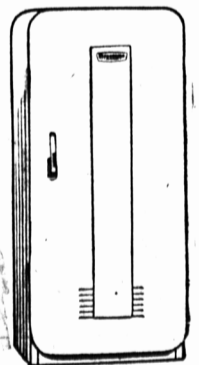
