WEDNESDAY, Nov. 26.—Nicolas Jean de Dien Soules, Duc de Balonatre, died this day anno 1857. Marshal Soules' military record is full of defeats; anno 1809 by Geo. John Moore at Corunna; in 1811 by Beresford at Albuera; in 1812 by Cotton at Llerena; in 1813 by Wellington at the Pyrenees, and again at St. Jean de Luz, again at Orthez, again at Tarbes, and again at Toulouse. In 1838 he was ambassador extraordinary to the coronation of Queen Victoria.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Statue of Hon. George Brown.

TORONTO, Nov 25
The statue erected in Queen's park, in memory of the late Hon. Geo. Brown, was unveiled to-day. Notwithstanding a heavy snow fall, a large throng assembled. Mr. J. D. Eger presided. The ceremony of unveiling the statue was performed by Hon. Alex. McKenzie, who was prevented by illness from speaking more than a few moments. The meeting then adjourned to the Convocation Hall of the University where addresses were delivered by Hon. Mr. Mowatt and Hon. George Allan. Hon. Mr. Mowatt made a masterly speech. The Chairman then on behalf of the Memorial Committee, handed the statue over to the City. Mayor Boswell accepted the trust in a neat speech, after which the Chairman declared the proceedings closed.

Activity at Woolwich.

LONDON, Nov. 25.
Great activity prevails at Woolwich, in the preparation of stores and munitions of war. The indications are that the expedition to Buchananland will be a large one. Several battalions have been ordered to place themselves in readiness for foreign service.

Movement of Troops.

DONGOLA, Nov. 25.
Spies who have arrived here report that the forces of El Mahdi, encamped around Khartoum, number between 15,000 and 20,000 men. The British troops are moving on to Handouk, twenty miles south of here, to avoid small-pox and cholera, which is prevailing along the route.

Woman's Rights.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.
On and after January 1st, next, 450 widows and unmarried women will be entitled in Ottawa city to vote for the election of Mayor and Aldermen. This is the result of Premier Mowat's partial extension of the franchise to women, and applies to all municipalities throughout Ontario.

The wife of R. S. White, of the Montreal Gazette, died yesterday. She was only 23 years of age.
Lady Lansdowne is being petitioned to use her influence to obtain the reprieve of Mrs. Butler, who is sentenced to be hanged on the 28th inst.

France and China are now trying for a settlement, both seem inclined to make large concessions to avoid any further trouble.

TORONTO, Nov. 26—10 a. m.

Fresh to strong winds from south and west; mostly cloudy weather, with occasional showers in southern and sleet and snow in northern portions; slightly higher temperature.

SINGULAR, BUT TRUE.—The Maggie Dalling, of this port, lately got ashore on the Bahamas, and still later met with another accident before she reached her destination in the West India Islands. The captain could not account for the vessel's running ashore, until the secret was explained by some captains who had carried similar cargoes to that on board the Dalling. It appears she had oil in cans, and the captains said the iron contained in the cans was sufficient to seriously affect the compasses. This is said to be a fact not generally known by shipmasters.—*Portland Press*

MONCTON BRASS AND IRON MANUFACTURING CO.—H. T. Stevens, W. J. Robinson, G. B. Lutz, E. C. Cole, C. A. Steeves, E. M. Etley, A. E. Killam, S. Crandall, and Borden & Atkinson, of Moncton, and M. B. Palmer, of Dorchester, have been incorporated as "The Moncton Brass and Iron Manufacturing Company, Limited," capital \$100,000, in two thousand shares of \$50 each. This is the company formed to purchase the property of the lock company, now in liquidation.

BUSINESS is still rushing at Goldie's flouring mills, in Guelph. On Friday last 578 barrels of flour were turned out, which is called the largest amount ever manufactured in a single day at one mill in Canada. The cooper shop at the mill is running day and night.—*Guelph Herald*.

THE reception to Sir John in Montreal will take the form of a procession, with the presentation of an address in the drill hall, a fireworks display on the Champ de Mars, and on the following day a levee at the Windsor and the banquet of the Junior C. servative Club in the evening.

THE value of the exports of the Dominion for the month of October was \$12,800,231, of which \$11,461,580 was goods the produce of Canada. The value of goods entered for consumption was \$5,624,455, a decrease of \$1,371,953 compared with the same month in 1883.

On Friday last, a paper called "Old Eliza" died at the Home for the Aged, Toronto. On her box being examined \$1,200 in gold and \$2,000 in other money was found. She had been supported by charity for about 32 years. No one knows her surname.

Forepaugh's sacred white elephant, the 'Light of Asia' is dead, from a cold which he contracted by a careless attendant leaving a window open all night. The animal was sick some time, and his distress greatly excited other members of the herd. 'Rocks,' the largest elephant in the herd, was so excited over the death of his companion that he made a desperate effort to break loose, and pulled his leg from the socket by a lunge on his iron chain. It has since been dangerous to approach him, and he stands on three legs groaning piteously. Mr. Forepaugh estimates his loss at \$32,000.
