TORONTO (CP) — Trade was dull with prices steady on top quality steers and heifers at the Ontario stockyards today. Plain quality cattle made the bulk of the supply and moved slowly at barely steady prices. Receipts: cattle 400; calves 110; hogs 300; sheep and lambs 140; holdover from Tuesday 210 cattle.

Choice steers 21.50-22.50; medium down to 18; common boner steers and heifers 9-11; good cows 11-11.50; canners down to 7; common light bulls 8-10; choice fed yearlings 22-23.50; mediums down to 19; mediums quality stockers 16-17.

Calve trade was very dull with top grades scarce. The bulk of the good to choice vealers sold at 21-23; an occasional top at 24; common to medium 12-20.

Hogs were steady at 25.50 for grade A; sows 17; 540 hogs sold out on Tuesday at 25.75.

Lambs, delivered by rail, 20; delivered by truck 19 for good ewes and wethers; bucks were discounted \$1 a hundredweight and heavy lambs were discounted as much as \$2 a hundredweight; common to medium 4-6.

WINNIPEG (CP) — Unfavorable harvest weather on the Prairies and pessimistic crop reports stimulated general demand on the Winnipeg grain exchange Wednesday and prices moved up. All oats futures scored new seasonal highs.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat overnight included: Belgium 460,000 bushels; Germany 125,000; and the United Kingdom and Malta, small lots.

Lakehead prices for the top grades of Class Two, IWA and domestic wheat advanced one eighth cent from Tuesday, except for class two durum which were unchanged.

NEW YORK (AP) — Buyers picked a handful of favorites Wednesday and bid prices up, but the stock market as a whole closed lower in a quiet manner.

Some of the best gains were scored by motors while others were in oils, business equipments, textiles, and farm implements. Railroads were depressed. Other divisions were mixed to lower.

Chrysler led the most active list for the second day up 1-12 at 69-18 on 55,000 shares. Tuesday the company disclosed plans for an aggressive auto sales campaign, and Wednesday the U. S. Army gave it \$160,000,000 in contracts for tanks.

It was followed by Celanese up 1-8 at 21-58, Remington Rand up 1-4 at 58, Packard unchanged at 2-5-8, and Studebaker-Packard when issued up 3-4 at 13-1-1.

Among Canadian stocks, Canadian Pacific, International Nickel and Distillers Seagram dropped 1-8 and McIntyre rose 1-4.

Royalite Oil, a Canadian issue, on the American stock exchange, also rose 1-4.

Westinghouse advanced a point at 78 1/2 and Shawinigan at 52 was 1/2 better. Quarter-point gains were scored by Gypsum, Minnesota and Ontario and Dominion Bridge.

Volume at 1 p.m. EST was just over 500,000 shares. Trading in most sections was slow but a few lower-priced uranium were active.

Utilities, steels, liquors, textiles, financial institutions and manufacturers were easier. Agricultures were strong and motors and construction mixed.

Association Of Consumers Pass Resolutions

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadians should get the benefit of any cut-price sale the federal government contemplates of its surplus butter stocks, the Canadian Association of Consumers said Wednesday.

The association affirmed this position and also adopted a resolution urging that Parliament review anti-dumping legislation passed at its last session. The resolution said the powers granted under the law should be curtailed.

On other resolutions, the CAC: 1. Expressed willingness to cooperate in any educational program that the Saskatchewan Farmers Union or other organization may start against the "indulgence of many teenagers in high-sugar-content drinks." The SFU resolution filed with the CAC resolutions committee had asked support for a ban under food laws of the sale of soft drinks in schools on grounds that some injure health.

2. Reaffirmed its disapproval of use of coupons and premiums as a form of advertising.

3. Referred to its textiles committee for investigation a resolution from the Prince Edward Island branch expressing concern over the "dangerously inflammable" materials used in making some types of children's snow suits.

BUTTER STOCKS RISING

The butter resolution, from the English section of the association's Quebec branch, expressed concern over rising stocks of butter accumulated by the government through price supports.

It said the dairy industry expects the reserve to touch 50,000,000 pounds by next spring and a large part of this reserve would have to be disposed of before it becomes inedible.

The association said Canadian taxpayers had paid for this butter and therefore should be entitled "to have the benefit of any reduced-price sales that may become necessary to dispose of these stocks."

Referring to anti-dumping legislation, the CAC said it "might unfairly penalize the consumers of Canada for the purpose of benefiting selected industries."

The legislation empowers the revenue department to establish for setting duties the price of imported goods according to the average price at which similar goods were sold in the exporting country for six months prior to export.

Approves Trade With Communists

NEW YORK (AP) — The Arch- bishop of Canterbury, Most Rev. Geoffrey Francis Fisher, said Wednesday foreign trade with Communist countries can build greater trust—without compromising principles.

Boarding the liner Queen Elizabeth to return to England, the Archbishop was asked by reporters what he thought of Britain's trade with Red China. He said: "I am not an economist, but on general principles, I think the more interchange of goods, the better. Whether it is with Communists or anyone else, it means a building up of trust."

"Anything that encourages trust is good, if it can be done without damage to fundamental principles."

A reporter suggested some people might object to "trading with a Godless people," and the Archbishop said:

"I have never known that Christianity says you can't have relations with a Godless nation. You don't have to compromise your own belief to do so."

CHRISTMAS PLANS

OTTAWA, (CP) — Downtown Sparks and Bank streets, two of the capital's busiest shopping thoroughfares, will have that Yuletide look next Christmas. Board of trade announced lamp standards will be decorated with red plastic poinsettias with illuminated yellow centres and black metal illuminated lanterns.
