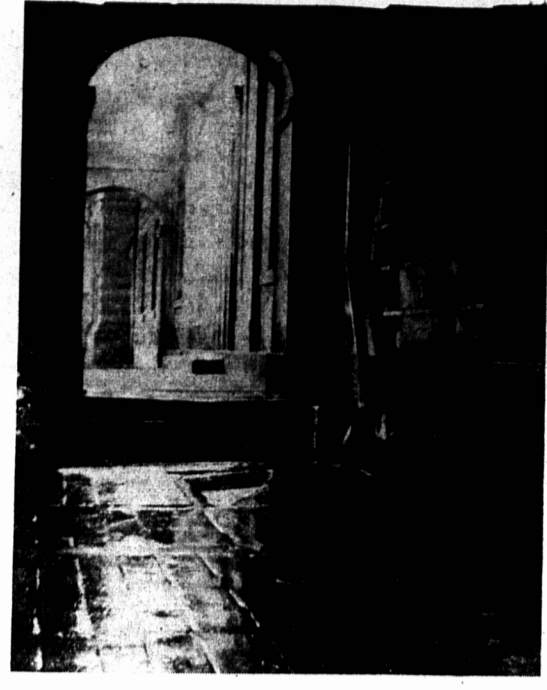

Paris. He is due at Geneva today with both Dulles and Bidault for the opening of the Geneva conference.

Eden told reporters Saturday night "there is absolutely no reason why my visit should cause either concern or apprehension."

Nevertheless, there was a feeling of tension in London. Eden conferred for more than an hour with French Ambassador Rene Massigli, and had a short conference with Canadian High Commissioner Norman Robertson. Officials said Britain also was in touch during the day with other Commonwealth governments.

MINISTERS CONFER

Called to hear the foreign secretary's report Sunday were Defence Minister Earl Alexander, Home Secretary Sir David Maxwell Fyfe, Lytton, War Secretary Anthony Head, Air Secretary Lord de l'Isle and Dudley and the three chiefs of staff.

The west looks upon Indo-China as the military gateway to all of Southeast Asia, including Siam, Burma and Malaya.

If the Reds controlled southern Indo-China, they would have an avenue for supply lines across the Gulf of Siam to feed arms and supplies to the estimated 5,000 Chinese Communist guerrillas in the Malayan jungles.

Britain, with 30,000 troops in Malaya, has succeeded in containing these rebels during the last five years because to a large extent they have been sealed off without ready access to military equipment.

ASHDOWN FOREST, England — (CP) — More than 1,400 acres of undergrowth and timber were destroyed by two fires in this Surrey area. Previously game wardens reported only two red deer — both females — were left in the historic forest.

ORMOND BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Mrs. Wanda Jennings, 28, a tall, blue-eyed blonde from St. Louis, Mo., Saturday night was crowned Mrs. America.

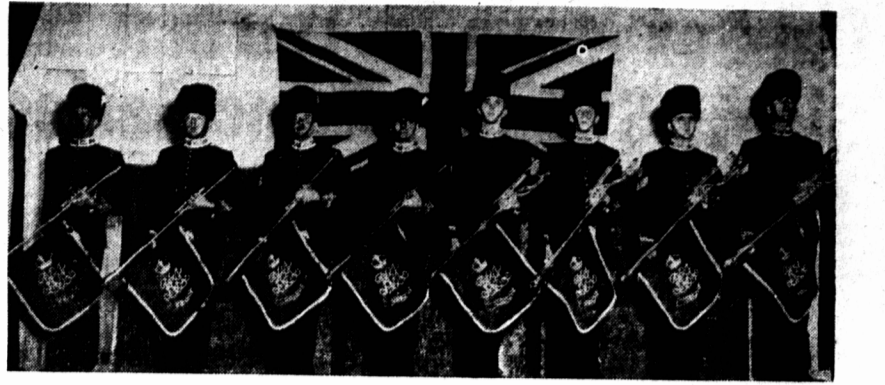

BAIL REFUSED
