A June Day Passes Alas, Far Too Quickly

An electrical storm visited our valley tonight, one of brief duration, as it happened, and apparently without inconvenience as to any interruption in our services, or harm done in the neighborhood.

"Come away from the door, and close it," James advised the one girl of the farm during the storm. "If you were caught out in it, well, there would be some excuse for watching it, but there's no need for you to court disaster indoors, now is there?" "But I love to see the play of lightning along the sky," she said. "It's like a great searchlight. It picks out objects in its beam, truly in a flash against the night. And then it's gone leaving all again dark."

"We remembered how close still in advance the dusk was if it were in daylight, the thought came, the birds would hush their singing. One would hear only odd chirpings in the quiet. And then the night shadows deepened, and lightning flashed along the sky, and presently zigzagged up and down against its dark lit, lighted momentarily the white of the house on the hill. And the tops of the spruces on the dam below were dark in the brightness. Thunder rumbled, not in any fearful crescendo of sound, "close enough" to claim notice. And the rain came down.

"Perhaps we had better," James began, noticing a flash linger in the yard. And we suspected his thoughts were going back over the years to his childhood, when at Alderlea, it was the custom during an electrical storm for the family to repair to the sitting-room in the main house, adjacent to the ell that is the kitchen, which always had a sheltered them safely. "But the day was fine," we recalled. "And — pleasantly warm."

"That was the day the German Zeppelin, the big dirigible, passed over the island on its first trans-Atlantic flight to, was it New York?" James recalled. "It seemed so near — the great silvery ship floating above our maple grove and woodlands. I happened to be down at the mill at the time, and with others there, we watched it out of sight," he said. "That was a long time ago," he sighed.

"In a way, 30 years seems a long time — to look ahead, that is, she said. "But to look back, it's nothing more than a dream."

And how long alas, think we, is a day — particularly one of June's own?
