Street Paving Program Starts In Montague

The street paving program got under way in Montague yesterday afternoon with the arrival of all necessary equipment. Streets to be paved include the New Road, School Street, the street adjacent the skating rink and Queen's Road on the north side, and MacDonald Avenue on the south, a total distance of approximately 1 1/4 miles. During the past week 10 car loads of chip gravel arrived here from Bedford, N. S., and is being stock-piled at Fraser and Anear lot. This will be placed over the gravel top which has already been laid by Poole and Beer construction company. One car of prime coating and two cars of asphalt have also arrived. Yesterday the grader shaped up the streets to be paved, and today they will receive the prime coat. Mr. Cliff Sherron, foreman, expects that they will begin laying the chip on Monday, and should the weather hold fine, the paving project will be completed by the end of the week.

Construction Of Valleyfield Road Nears Completion

Construction on the Valleyfield road is nearing completion as the equipment is now located in a small stretch on either side of Sutherland's Bridge, where sharp hills are being cut down to gradual grades. All other sections are completed except for graveling. The road extends from the cross road near Montague to the Kilmuir road bridge, a distance of approximately three miles, and is 66 feet wide with a 32-foot top. It has been diverted to follow a new route from either end of Sutherland's Bridge, avoiding the many difficult curves in the former road. The cutting down of the hills provided the greatest difficulty, rock strata requiring the use of a ripping machine before the maintainer or bull dozer could continue the work. Yesterday the hydraulic arm on the maintainer was broken, delaying work until it had been welded. When the ripper had completed its work, the bulldozer made short shrift of the large boulders, pushing them over the side of the hill. The fill-in has been so constructed to give only a gradual grade and sweeping curve, which with the proposed side elevation will provide much easier travel over this route than heretofore. It is also proposed that this part of the road will have a 40-foot top, and posts extended on either side. This new road, together with the new wide bridge at Sutherland's will do much to increase the traffic in the Valleyfield area, and be of great assistance to farmers in the moving of their produce.

James, from whom Robert Lister MacNeill claims descent. In 1915 Mr. Robert Lister MacNeill petitioned the Lord Lyon for the use of the Arms of the MacNeils of Barra. He came forward under a deed of nomination made by his late father in his favour as against an elder brother still surviving.

"It is thus perfectly clear that Mr. Wallace MacNeill (and now Colin's) position and claim can be in no way affected by any deed of nomination made by Roderick MacNeill, or indeed by any other member of the junior line, at any time. Then Lord Lyon accepted the pedigree submitted while remarking at the same time that "there is very little of what may be called legal proof of this pedigree", but in order to protect the interests of the elder son he only granted Mr. Robert Lister MacNeill the Arms with a second son's difference.

"This petition was presented during the war and neither Mr. Wallace MacNeill nor any of his family was aware that an attempt was to be made to claim the Arms at all until they were later informed that a grant had in fact been made.

"Mr. Robert Lister MacNeill has now petitioned the Lord Lyon for the use of the undifferenced Arms of the MacNeils of Barra as if he were the eldest son. It is under these circumstances that Mr. Wallace MacNeill has entered a caveat, to make sure that in this case no vital steps will be taken without his knowledge.

"Similar MacNeill committees have been named in Cape Breton county and Prince Edward Island. The MacNeils of Cape Breton and Victoria counties represent more than 90 per cent of the Clan domiciled in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Colin MacNeill of Vernon River is held by many Maritime members of the clan to be their hereditary chief. His father, Roderick MacNeill, paid a visit to Scotland and the original home of the MacNeils, Barra, in 1900 and was welcomed as chief.

His eldest son, Wallace MacNeill, succeeded him, according to the family, and died Sept. 22, 1949. Wallace had a brother, Pope, who went to Western Canada and has not been heard from for about forty years, so that the family presume that another younger brother, the present Colin MacNeill, is descended to the chieftainship.

Mr. Roderick MacNeill, carried on a considerable correspondence about the matter but the papers have since been destroyed. Reference books give Robert Lister MacNeill, a New York newspaperman as being the forty-fifth chief. The explanation of the Vernon River MacNeils is that they are descended from an elder branch of the family.

Barra itself has passed out of the hands of the family, having been sold in 1840 to Col. John Gordon of Cluny.

Letters from the late Neil MacPhee of Vatersay, Isle of Barra, a man uncommonly skilled in the tradition history of Barra, to the Obit Times of July 31st, 1918.

"The researches of the late Hector R. MacNeill, who was born at Iona, N.S. in 1834 and the late Stephen MacNeill of Beaver Cove, N.S. Both these gentlemen were recognized authorities on this subject.

"Also the opinion of Messrs. Davidson & Sons, solicitors of Castle Square, Edinburgh, Scotland, who represented the late Wallace MacNeill before the Lord Lyons hearing in 1938. Messrs. Davidson and Syme stated at that time: "Mr. MacNeill claims descent from Gillean MacNeill, son of Roderick MacNeill of Barra who obtained a charter of the estate of Barra in 1683, and his claim to the Chieftainship is based upon the assertion that this Gillean was senior to his brother,
