A despatch from Treshed, Asiatic Russia, says that the governor of the Trans Caspian territories reports an outbreak of the plague at Candahar, Afghanistan. A large body of Russian troops has accordingly been ordered to Candahar and Herat.

Port Darwin, a small but important town in South Australia, was almost entirely wiped out by one of those fearful hurricanes which periodically strike the coast of Australia, destroying property and very often life.

Advices from Paris state that the Greco-Turkish dispute is being referred to the arbitration court at The Hague. The government submitted a measure in the legislative chamber, appropriating £1,000 to the relief of the Crete refugees at Milo and elsewhere.

It is announced upon what is regarded as good authority that one of the objects of the visit of Count Muraviev, Russian minister of foreign affairs, to Paris was to arrange for an increase in the strength of the Russian and French fleets in Turkish waters.

TURKISH REFORM PROTOCOL DRAWS

But it will be a Long Time Before the Porte is Reached. According to late advices from Berlin there is the very best authority for the statement that a draft of the reform protocol, as completed by the ambassador in Constantinople, is drawn upon the assumption that the Sultan will accept the proposals.

There is no reference therein, either directly or indirectly, to any possibility of a resort to coercion on the part of the powers to enforce them. Copies of the document reached the foreign offices in Vienna and Berlin on Saturday, and it is understood that the text of the proposal entirely coincides with desires expressed by the emperor and count Goluchowski, the Austrian minister of foreign affairs, at the recent conference at Kiel.

The opposition of the Kaiser to any further consideration of the question of coercion to enforce Turkish reforms may have the effect of neutralizing the results of the ambassadorial conferences though it is understood that in reference to the wishes of the other powers Baron de Calice, the Austrian ambassador, authorized, in presenting the sultan with the proposals of the powers, to inform Turkish emperor that the powers are prepared to enforce acceptance and operation in regard to the extent or character or method of applying coercive measures, nothing was decided upon.

A pretty good idea of the situation may be gained by the utterance of the Vossische Zeitung, which says: "The greatest task of the powers will only begin when the question is touched. Time will yet elapse before the protocol, after being approved by each of the governments concerned in its formulation, goes through the formal diplomatic course of presentation to the Porte."

This formal having been gone through with, the proposals will be presented to the sultan by his ministers, and they will be certain to be referred back to the ambassadors throughout the prolonged process of exchange of communications extending until 1898, unless events in the meantime shall slatter the sultan's regime and compel the powers to play each its own game.

It is true, that now, as before the previously called concert the powers are insincere and do not intend to take concerted action in the matter of coercion, and the sultan knows they do not.
