Schooner Seized at Port Hawkesbury

PORT HAWKESBURY, Oct. 23.—The St. Pierre schooner St. Joseph, and a quantity of liquor not reported, was seized here on Saturday by Protective Officer J. W. Gordon, of the cruiser Gladiator, and Special Officer Bourinot, for violating the revenue law and for not reporting at Customs Houses at Big Bras d'Or, Grand Narrows, St. Peter's and Port Hawkesbury. The vessel was 76 tons and was bound for Charlottetown.

IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Clearing Out Remnants of the Boer Forces.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Lord Roberts reports from Pretoria under date of October 21st that the Boers who attacked Jagersfontein succeeded in releasing the Boer prisoners in the town before they were repulsed. Their loss was twenty, including Commandant Visser.

The Boer sympathizers inside the town assisted the Boers. Lord Roberts adds that they will be heavily punished for it. Lord Methuen has arrived at Zwartkops in Western Transvaal and reports a loss of six men killed and ten wounded.

General Knox announces that the mounted infantry attacked the Boers near Kroonstad, driving them off and inflicting considerable loss.

A determined attack was made by the Boers on Pauresmoth near Jagersfontein. The Boers were repulsed. The British lost two killed and six wounded.

General Barton fought at Frederickstad and captured several positions. He lost two killed and four wounded.

A Contradiction.

DEAR SIR,—We notice in Saturday's (20th inst.) issue of your paper that Thomas A. M. Leach, Esq., stated at a meeting at York, on Friday evening last, that Holmes & McLeod had been awarded the contract for the Summerside breakwater twice, and had thrown up both contracts, receiving back their checks from the Department, and also that the present contractor has the work for a much "larger figure."

The facts are that neither of us ever had a tender accepted—never had a contract for the Summerside breakwater; and the figure for which the present contractor is to do the work is not higher than former tenders but 50 to 60 per cent lower than the lowest previous tender.

MEETING AT TRACADIE CROSS

A Great Success for the Liberal-Conservative Party.

The meeting at Tracadie Cross last night was largely attended, and, from the Liberal-Conservative standpoint, was a decided success.

Mr. Martin opened the meeting, speaking for about an hour. He dealt with the general policy of the Conservative party and showed the rotten foundation upon which the policy of his opponents rested. He made an excellent impression and received great applause. The meeting was apparently with him from start to finish.

Mr. McKinnon, who followed, tried to make the best of a bad case.

Mr. McCourt was received with applause and cheers. He spoke ably and well, reviewing the policy of the Laurier and Farquharson Governments showing that they were traitors and deceivers in all their public declarations. He predicted that as the 7th of November was the anniversary of the completion of the C. P. R., so on the same day this year an equal victory would perch on the banner of the Liberal-Conservative party. The audience was so well pleased with Mr. McCourt's speech that everywhere could be heard expressions of regret that Farquharson and Peters were depriving the people of Port Amherst of the services of such an able representative.

Premier Farquharson followed, speaking for about half an hour. He did not talk politics, but the ring of his voice showed the wail of lamentation and despair. He pleaded for support for his Attorney-General.

D. McNeill followed Mr. Farquharson, speaking for about an hour. He reviewed the career of the Laurier and Farquharson Governments, making a splendid impression.

Hon. J. H. Cumiskey then spoke briefly in favor of Mr. McKinnon.

Mr. Martin closed the proceedings. Cheers were then given for Mr. Martin, Sir Charles Tupper and the Liberal-Conservative party.

—Private advices state that Mr. Foeter is now carrying everything before him in St. John's, and that the betting, which at the beginning of the campaign was in favor of Mr. Blair, is now in his favor. The public meetings exhibit a strong feeling against the Government.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that Mr. Cook's attitude is a double help to the Conservatives. There is the effect of his letters, and there is not the \$10,000 to fight that "the machine" would have had if he had come to terms on the senatorship deal.

THE SOLDIER'S RECEPTION.

The loyal people of Charlottetown are determined to leave nothing undone that will contribute towards the success of the reception to be tendered the Islanders now on their way home from South Africa. At a meeting of the representatives of the City Council, militia and societies last evening further arrangements were made along this line.

Col. Moore, who presided, explained what had been done at the previous meeting and several sub-committees reported.

The returning soldiers are expected to arrive in Halifax on the 29th, and it is thought that the Islanders will not remain more than one night in the garrison town. They will be brought from Pictou by the P. I. S. S., which will be due at half-past seven in the evening. The Princess will be conveyed by two of the Dominion steamers, the Stowley and the Acadia, and when they are coming in the harbor a salute will be fired from Fort Edward which will be replied to by the ships.

The militia and societies, accompanied by the Boys' Brigade and the students of Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's Collegiate, with bands of music, will meet the returning soldiers at the wharf and escort them to the Market Square, where they will be presented with an address which will in all likelihood be replied to by Lieut. Macdonald and Rev. T. F. Patterson. There will be a procession, band and general rejoicing, in which the Caledonian Club, the Irish societies, the Sons of England, the Foresters and other societies will all participate. The programme will appear on the approach of the event.
