JURY FAILS

In opening his charge to the jury, Chief Justice Campbell told them that the accused must get the benefit of any reasonable doubt. He then commenced to review the evidence and said that there did not appear to be any reasonable doubt but that two men assaulted Ford and robbed him at the same time. He felt that the only issue which should give the jury any difficulty was whether the accused or one of them were the men who committed the robbery.

He then went into the matter of Ford's opportunity to remember them well enough to identify them and considered the manner in which he had been asked to make the identification while they were sitting in the court room awaiting their preliminary hearing. He said he thought it was a poor method of identification but that Andrew had explained that there were about 50 people in the room and while the prisoners were together, they were among the other persons present.

Ford was brought in and he pointed them out. "In the circumstances I don't see what stronger identification you could get." The court reminded the jury that they must be satisfied beyond a reasonable doubt and must scrutinize the identification carefully. He said, on the other hand, that whether the accused were the two men who committed the alleged robbery is best known to themselves and they have not produced any evidence to show that they were some place else when the incident occurred. They had no alibi. He said, "My ruling on the law is that the evidence of identification produced by the Crown is sufficient in the eyes of the law to shift the burden of proof to the accused and that they were not the individuals who committed the alleged offence."

He stated that they must be satisfied with the honesty of Ford's evidence and of the over all picture of guilt of the accused beyond a reasonable doubt.

Attorney General W. E. Darby K. C. and Mr. J. Harold Goodwin represented the Crown and Mr. H. F. McPhee, K. C. was attorney for the accused.

Winters reported that 460,000 new housing units have been built in Canada since 1946.

However, the number of new families, resulting from marriage and immigration, had exceeded the number of new houses built in most years since the end of the Second World War. The net family formation rate dropped in the last two years and there was a net gain of about 40,000 housing units.

In 1950, production of construction materials was at an all-time high. It had been feared that the defence production program would increase supply shortages this year, but so far the situation was not as bad as anticipated.

Steel sheets and pipe are in short supply, he said. A shortage of steel for furnaces and of pipe for plumbing could disrupt the whole housing program.

Presbyterian General Assembly Meetings Continue

OTTAWA, June 7.—(CP)—The 77th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada today was told the ministry of the church can be replaced every 20 or 25 years as the result of the great increase in the number of volunteers working for "a church on the march."

This statement was made by Rev. Finlay G. Stewart, minister of St. Andrew's Church, Kitchener, Ont., when he addressed the Assembly.

He urged every minister and elder to make full-time Christian service a subject of continual prayer. Every church session should establish a committee on students whose responsibility it would be to encourage young men and women to enter full-time service.

James Dutton of Peterborough, Ont., said he believed it is the responsibility of the congregations to help those members of the church wishing to enter the ministry.

Mr. Dutton, reporting on the work of the Board of Administration, told the Assembly that with ever-mounting costs in all fields the present revenue of the church in Canada, although up from other years, is not sufficient to meet current needs.

Contributions during the year for all purposes totalled more than \$5,000,000.

He advocated a budget of at least \$10,000,000 a year, some \$250,000 more than at present.
