Race Drivers Show Skills

Racing fans at the Charlottetown Driving Park witnessed a race event Tuesday night as Tea Time Gal went down at the first turn. That it is an unusual sight to see a horse fall, or an accident occur, is a tribute to the driving ability of the horsemen at the local oval. For it is not too often that there is a pileup on the Charlottetown track or at least there have not been a great number in ratio to the number of races presented at the Driving Park.

One must remember that more than 50 cards are presented on the track over the run of one racing season, and with each of these having an average of nine dashes there are more than 450 races seen. The element of danger involved in driving a trotter or pacer escapes most people but the drivers have no easy task when the gate comes up to the starting line. Almost every driver in the field has already got some idea of the strategy to be used and often three or four plan to go to the top of the pack.

It is not easy, at least for this observer, to forget that each driver is in control of both a sulky and his horse, both of which take up more than a bit of room on the track. And when about three drivers decide that they are going to be the first into the turn, it is a minor miracle that they do not collide with one another. They have to judge the width of their sulky so no wheels will be locked, they have to judge their speed so they will not get hung out; they have to be sure that if they do pull in they will not cut off the driver following them and cause a break; they have to contend with their horse if it should jump and they must keep in mind the pace that they want to follow, all while their horse is tugging at them all the time. And this mind you takes place in the space of about 15 seconds as the field goes around the first turn.

ACCIDENT INFREQUENT

Why there are not more accidents is beyond me but it says a lot for the skill of the drivers. The greater the number of horses the greater the risk of an accident and that is just what happened Tuesday evening. Ten entries were in the field when Tea Time Gal went down and that there was not a major accident just goes to show that the drivers all have superb ability to act and react, correctly, on the spur of the moment.

For one can not imagine the thoughts of a driver when suddenly he sees a horse and driver fly to the ground in front of him.

And what must go through his mind when the horse he is following makes a break which the driver can't handle for a second or two.

And what must go through his mind when he is coming home with a good chance to win and as well has to think about getting out of a box, or about the wheel of the other sulky spinning less than an inch from his.

And what must he think when he sees a hole that is almost big enough to go through but he is not sure, while all the same the outcome of the race depends on his making decisions quickly.

And what he must think if his horse goes off stride or he loses his balance in the sulky.

And what he must think when the race is not going as he planned it.

And the disappointment a driver must feel when a good horse goes lame.

And the joy he must feel when he wins by a nose after the horse and himself combined in perfect union and beat a better or equal horse on the basis of a better drive.

To see the poker faces of the drivers at the Park and their big noses when they are asked whether their horse is going to win one would think that they have not got a worry in the world. But they have, let me assure you.

Lib. Senator Keith Davey Elected CFL Commissioner

WINNIPEG (CP) — Keith Davey, a man with a reputation for getting things done in politics, Wednesday accepted a three-year term as commissioner of the Canadian Football League. He resigned from the party job after the Nov. 4 federal election, in which the Liberals failed to achieve the Commons majority they expected. "I believe it is important to the Senate that I do a good job as commissioner, that it is important to the league that I do a good job as a senator."

APPOINTED TO SENATE

He was happy with his appointment to the Senate, Feb. 24. "One of the great weaknesses of my political career so far is that it has been spent almost totally in organization," he said. "I've always been interested in the legislative side. I am delighted at the chance to prove myself in the legislative sense."

He will retain his Liberal affiliation but will not campaign actively on any major level. CFL people were concerned about a possible conflict of interest.

Senator Davey appeared before representatives of all CFL clubs Tuesday night and spent more than an hour discussing his aims.

"I believe I convinced these gentlemen that there need be no conflict between my senatorial obligations and my duties as commissioner," he said.

He will work hard to fulfil his senatorial duties but noted that senators can miss 21 sitting days before losing any money — \$120 a day after that — and need sit only one day every two years in the Senate to retain their status.

Senator Davey is married to the former Isabel Hart of Woodstock, Ont. The Daveys have three children, Donald, 10, Ian, 8, and Catherine, 2.

Pat Mahoney of Calgary, chairman of a four-man CFL committee charged with finding a suitable successor to Halter, approached Senator Davey after he was informed the senator might be interested in the position.

Splurge, Glamorous Wick Split Western Honors

SUMMERSIDE — A Charlottetown horse and a 3-year-old bay mare owned by Stanley Mayhew, shared top honors in the feature event of the nine-dash race card held at the local oval last night. Stanley Mayhew's Glamorous Wick, reined by Junior Chappell, stepped the fastest mile of the night when she went twice around the oval in 2:06.4 in the fourth dash on the card. Second in this dash was a nine-year-old brown horse, Splurge, owned by H. Simmonds of Charlottetown and reined by H. Smallwood. The two horses switched places in the second-half of this event with Splurge emerging first under the wire in 2:00 flat, only 1.5 of a second slower than Glamorous Wick's mile. Again there were no double dash winners on the card. The other winners included Pine Ridge Marion, Sandbyee, White Choice, Annan Gal, Gary T. Adios, Stalag Hanover and Grattan Abe.

In the final dash of the night Grattan Abe took a new mark of 2:13.4. The six-year-old bay horse owned by Allie McNeill of Summerside, also paid \$12 to place in this event and combined with Jolly Don to pay \$16.80 in the second exactor race of the night. A quinnella combination of Real Spirit and Pine Ridge Marion in the 14th race returned \$21.60 while the first exactor, on the 7th race paid \$16. Nouncer, Eric Johnstone, was absent for last night's race program and Laird "Boo" Frame, the manager of the Horsemen's Club, sponsors of the local race way, stepped in and performed a creditable job.

The largest pay of the night was the daily double on races 5 and 6 combined in this feature to pay \$64.70, the largest pay of the night.

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Chovalo Favored

NEW YORK (AP) — George Chovalo, the durable Canadian champion who went 15 rounds with Cassius Clay, is an 8-to-5 favorite over Argentina's Oscar Bonavena for tonight's heavyweight fight at Madison Square Garden.

The 10-round main event starts at 10 p.m. EDT with no radio or television coverage.

Chovalo walked into Clay's best punches and kept on going to maintain his reputation as one of the toughest heavyweights in the business in the March 29 scrap at Toronto. He has a 35-12-2 record with 28 knockouts and never has been stopped.

The fighters and promoters have tried everything to steam up the bout. They asked for a fight to the finish but the commission turned them down. They also lost out in a request to let the fight go an extra five rounds if it was all even after 10.

The musicians' union thumbed down Bonavena's proposed ring debut as a pop singer with a madolin.

Cap Peterson drove in two runs with a bases-loaded single and Lanier delivered two more with his double.

Haller singled across another run in the seventh and Jim Hart capped the Giants' scoring in the ninth with his 18th homer.

Ron Herbel gained his second victory without a loss but needed relief help in the eighth after giving up a two-run homer to Ernie Banks. Billy Williams and John Boccabella also homered for the Cubs.

The Giants pounded on Ernie Broglio in the first inning of the nightcap. Jim Davenport singled in one run before Haller crashed his 13th homer, then knocked him out in the third.

Losers Fred Talbot checked the American League leaders onto singles until the seventh, when Brooks Robinson singled. Boog Powell walked and Bleflary, a former Yankee farmhand, hit the first pitch into the right field bleachers for his 12th homer of the year.

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The Giants won the opener 3-2, scoring all their runs in the fifth inning and holding off the Cubs for right-hander Gaylord Perry's ninth victory of the season.

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Giants Sweep Twin Bill; Orioles Blank Yankees

NEW YORK (AP) — Steve Barber pitched a four-hitter and Curt Bleflary blasted a three-run homer in the seventh inning as Baltimore-Orioles blanked New York Yankees 3-0 Wednesday night.

Barber gave up an infield single to Hector Lopez with one out in the second inning and then retired 14 Yankees in order before walking Mickey Mantle in the seventh. After Joe Pepitone grounded into a double play Elston Howard doubled for the second hit off the Oriole lether.

The other New York hits were singles by Clete Boyer in the eighth and Pepitone in the ninth.

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John Surtees Leaves Ferrari

MODENA, Italy (Reuters) — John Surtees, ace British racing driver, and the Ferrari racing team have agreed in sever relations, Ferrari announced Wednesday.

The decision was announced after a meeting here Wednesday between the 32-year-old former world champion driver and the founder and head of the Ferrari firm, Enzo Ferrari, over a dispute between Surtees and the Ferrari team chief, Eugenio Dragoni.

Surtees objected to Dragoni's decision to replace him by Italian driver Ludovico Scarfiotti at the Le Mans 24-hour race last Saturday.

Ferrari officials said Dragoni feared Surtees had not sufficiently recovered from serious injuries he received at the wheel of a Ferrari in an accident last fall at Mosport, Ont.
