Prince Fed. Of Agriculture Adopts Several Resolutions

O'LEARY — Several resolutions were adopted by the annual meeting of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture here Thursday.

These included provision of a second reliable icebreaking ferry, expressing the appropriate authorities the particular hardship that could be caused should the price of lumber be lowered; requesting the department of education to provide school boards and secretaries with a clearly worded statement on school supplements; urging the department of education to encourage good attendance on the part of local schools; the restoration of the premium of grade "A" bogs to its former level, and if possible increased and continued as a permanent feature of Canadian hog policy.

Requesting the provincial government to increase its share

of the time money to prevent an increase in the price owing to the lowering of the federal contribution; expressing thanks to the department of education and boards of regional high schools for their decisions to close schools for a week in order to assist in potato harvesting and further that this be made a permanent feature; that milk products be placed in schools and soft drinks eliminated;

That farmers be urged to grow and store grain to finish cattle property and a cost-of-production, limited quality floor price on potatoes be established.

In addition a resolution provided that the term of office of a vice-president be extended for one year as a director if the delegate is entitled to take part in the election so desired, and that the boards of directors of the three county federations be asked to name a suitable committee
