BRIOT, ZERELDE, L. Kichham, master to Peake Bros. & Co., arrived here on the 8th inst., from Shoreham. This vessel will be ready to take in cargo to-morrow, and will sail for Liverpool direct this week, carrying lobsters at a low rate of freight.

UPPER PRINCE STREET electric light was extinguished between nine and ten o'clock last night, to the great inconvenience of all persons travelling the street, as the night was dark and the platform unsafe from the number of holes and broken planks.

THE clerk of the crown in chancery, at Ottawa, has received the final revised voters' lists from the following electoral districts: Nova Scotia, Pictou, Kings, Halifax, Inverness, Lunenburg, Shelburne, Guysborough, New Brunswick: Gloucester, York, Victoria, Charlotte. Prince Edward Island: Kings county district.

A cablegram has been received in Toronto, announcing that the Rev. Dr. Kane, grand master of the Royal Orange Association, Belfast, and George Hill Smith, barrister, a deputation from the Irish Loyal and Patriotic Union, will visit this country and are expected about the first week in September. They will deliver addresses in the principal cities of Canada and the United States, and will present the views of the loyalist minority of Ireland on the subject of home rule.

A PHENOMENON occurred at Valcartier, near Quebec, on the 6th, in the shape of a blazing meteor making a rapid descent. The meteor was probably ten feet in circumference. After touching the earth it emitted a strange light, reminding one of the infernal regions. The sight worked up the minds of the people, many conjuring up the worst fears, and looking forward to a speedy dissolution of the universe. What most enhanced their fears was the fact that just previous to the occurrence the sky lowered, the beasts of the field sent up unearthly and distressing screeches, bringing the credulous trembling to their knees. Within the past few days the lightning has been very severe, and earthquake shocks have been frequent.

A LARGE American fishing schooner ran ashore on Friday night, last, at Melsaac's Point, near Campbell's Cove, East Point. The wrecking steamer, which is at work near there on the wreck of the ironclad Phoenix, went to her assistance, but we have not learned whether she has been able to help her or not. The chances of getting her afloat depend entirely upon the state of the weather. The northeast of yesterday (Sunday) has probably not bettered her position any. She lies on her starboard side, side on to the shore, with bow to the westward. We have not been able to find out her name, but it is said she came from the Gut of Canso on Friday, and was on her way to the fishing grounds. She is one of the seiners.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court to-day two drunkards were disposed of, and a pedlar named Simon White, well known among the market people, was convicted of larceny from Messrs. Perkins & Sterns and sentenced to 6 months with hard labor. Fred McLean was charged by W. A. Leard with having obtained a buggy under false pretences, and after hearing the evidence the Magistrate adjourned the case until Wednesday, he having doubts as to whether the evidence sustained the charge. An adjourned assault case was disposed of—the defendant being fined \$3 and costs. In the application of Mrs. McArthur to set aside an execution issued out of the city court against her by Mrs. Rodd, and which was heard some days ago, the Magistrate set aside the execution as having been improperly issued.

ABOUT half-past one o'clock yesterday, Mr. Isaac Carter, of Geo. Carter & Co., had occasion to visit his store on Queen Street. On his arrival he tried to open the shop door but the key would not enter. After probing at the lock for about ten minutes a noise as of a key falling was heard on the inside of the door, and almost simultaneously the key in his hand turned in the lock and the door opened. He went in and picked up the key from where it lay on the floor. It was a peculiar looking arrangement—a piece of carpenter's iron square, with a key filed on each end. An examination of the store revealed the fact that of the \$7.10 left in the till on Saturday night, \$1.40 had been carried off, and that the rear door was open. It is thought that at the time of Mr. Carter's visit the thief was in the store, and left the key in the lock so as to prevent the entrance of any person until he had made his escape from the rear of the building.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

THE C. P. R. AHEAD.

All Previous Records Beaten.

MONTEAL, Aug. 9. The first tea train via the C. P. R. arrived here early on Saturday morning ahead of schedule time, having been only seven days from Vancouver to Montreal. The vessel left Yokohama on the 19th of June, and arrived at Vancouver on the 28th of July. On the 30th July the first train conveying part of the cargo and consisting of seventy cars was despatched east. This record beats all time previous made on the Pacific roads to the south of us. Eight of the cars west from Brockville to New York, the balance is destined for Montreal.

THE FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT

Halifax All Aglow.

HALIFAX, Aug. 9. Thousands of persons are arriving anxious to witness the expected Firemen's Tournament. A great many arrived by the boat from Boston this morning. The chief interest centres in the half mile hose race. A dinner on temperance principles will be given the firemen. Saturday last was given up to cricketing, baseball, yachting and rifle shooting. The decorations on the Halifax engines are perfectly gorgeous, over five thousand dollars having been already expended on this one item.

Serious State of Affairs in Belfast.

BELFAST, Aug. 9. The situation here is critical and alarming. A further force of four hundred infantry have arrived by special train from Dublin. Rioting has been carried on all day. The police fired on the mob, killing six and wounding twenty-six. The greatest excitement prevails. Many of the whiskey shops have been wrecked and pillaged. More troops are expected to-morrow. It is believed that fully two hundred persons in all have been wounded.

LATER.

ELVEN persons were killed, and one hundred and thirty seriously wounded in yesterday's riots. The fighting was resumed to-day with great fierceness, and a great many were wounded. The soldiers fired on the rioters at close quarters. One thousand two hundred more soldiers arrived to-day. At noon the riot was assumed more serious proportions, and it is feared that terrible carnage will result.

Extension of Telegraphic Facilities

MONTEAL, Aug. 9. Through telegraphic connections have been made with London by means of the Mackay-Bennett commercial cables. There has been a general exchange of congratulations on this consummation.

The Penalty of a Free Ride.

MONCTON, Aug. 9. Edward Cass, a Halifax boy, had his leg and arm cut off whilst stealing a ride under a railway car. A woman named Evans dropped dead here on Saturday.

"And Still they Come."

NIAGARA, Ont., Aug. 9. Potts and Hazlet, the latest addition to the army of cranks, successfully went through the whirlpool rapids in a cask on Saturday. Fifteen thousand people were present.

An Expression of Confidence.

MONTEAL, Aug. 9. Sir John A. Macdonald made a lengthy address to the workmen of Victoria, B. C., who, in reply, expressed their utmost confidence in the Premier.

A Youthful Heroine.

MONTEAL, Aug. 9. Miss Greene, 18 years old, the daughter of the well known hatter, saved her father from drowning in the harbor here to-day.

Increasing the Fisheries Protection.

LONDON, Aug. 9. The British fleet in North American waters is to be largely increased in order to efficiently protect the fisheries.

Congratulations in Order.

LONDON, Aug. 9. Sir Charles Tupper and the other Agents-General have heartily congratulated the new Colonial Secretary, Stanhope.

The Puritan Defeated.

BOSTON, Aug. 9. The Mayflower came in first in the New York Club yacht race on Saturday, and the Puritan second.

Michael Davitt's Arrival.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. Michael Davitt, one of the delegates to the Irish National League of America, has arrived here.

Reported Illness of the Pope.

PARIS, Aug. 9. It is rumored that His Holiness the Pope is very ill.

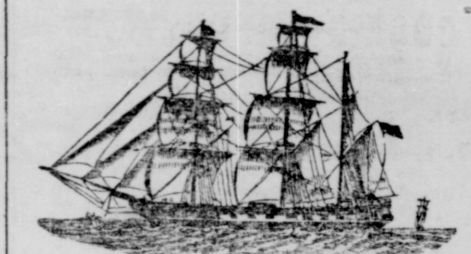
