VESSEL WRECKED.

First Mate Drowned—Rest of Crew Escape.

St. JOHN, Nov. 23.—Fern schooner Lena Pickup, went ashore at west shore, twenty miles east of St. John, on Wednesday night. She was bound from Halifax for Port Greville. Captain Matheson says that the weather was thick and he did not think it safe to go into the basin until morning so he stood westward. The first thing he knew he found himself right on shore.

The second mate, Stephen Chiffon, of Newfoundland, with one of the hands, got a boat over, but she was swamped and Chiffon was drowned.

The vessel went so close to the shore that the rest of the crew went ashore by a ladder the other side of which was placed on the rock. The vessel was pounded to fragments in a short time.

AN OPEN LETTER

To the Hon. Donald Farquharson, Premier.

MY DEAR PREMIER,—You have been to Ottawa on another delegation at the country's expense. It is to be hoped that you will issue your manifesto at once explaining the reasons assigned for hurrying on the elections after you secured the support of Dr. Douglas to join it with Mr. Pineau. There was, therefore, no reasonable excuse to take any advantage of the people till the four years are up. The chief reason for bringing on this election is that you have been anxious to defeat Mr. Wise's petition against Douglas and prevent the further exposure of the machine.

The Conservatives handed up the reins of Government in 1891 with only a debt of \$53,442.21, after the half-yearly subsidy was received, with no taxes extracted from the people and no permanent debt. You started on a dash-away career, plunged the country into debt, falsified the public accounts, pretending to have a sinking fund according to law, and with the actual expenditures and contracts to be completed, the country is sunk fully one million dollars.

If you, views on Dominion politics are in accord with your party, you must view with alarm the large increase of the public debt and controllable expenditure, and you must know that the farmers are unduly taxed now. How are you going to manage the business? You must know that it is the duty of the Government in power to provide the remedy and formulate its plans, and when giving an account of your stewardship, you are the man responsible to the country as to your future plans.

The accounts are not true and convey a false impression. Why don't you immediately take the people into your confidence and explain the financial situation to the people as we have Clue Books only up to last December.

You have collected in taxes from the people of this country from 1894 to 1899, \$288,649.06; add to this the taxes collected for 1900 and you will have 55 or 60 thousand more. Add to this the expenses of collecting the tax, 5 p. c., and the salaries of your tax officials, and the total will be further augmented as money the people receive no benefit whatever from. You must, therefore, see that the running expenses of the Conservatives for their last nine years without taxes was a very good record,—while your expenses, notwithstanding the borrowed money and over three hundred thousand of taxes, shows increasing deficits. What have you done with the money? There must be a leak somewhere? There must have been extra oil for the machine and bootling expenses on the road at election times to keep yourselves in power. Come out with the truth. The people must extort the truth from you, and I would suggest to you that you audit your accounts for 1900 up to the date of dissolution, so that we may see what you have been doing with the people's money. Don't imagine that you are Sir Louis or Sir Wilfrid Laurier or plain Mr. Joseph I. Tarte. When three-fifths of the electors of P. E. Island declared against them, four-fifths is a reasonable estimation against you. Though hand join in hand, the wicked shall not escape punishment.

A CITIZEN'S OPINION.

SIR,—In all charity it must be assumed that Mr. Geo. J. Rogers is not the writer of the letter in yesterday's Patriot to which his name is appended, for it is impossible to imagine how any person with a grain of sense could write such stupid stuff. At the outset the writer of the letter quotes two paragraphs from THE EXAMINER the substance of which is that Hon. Mr. Rogers had been refused a re-nomination after he had signified his willingness to contest the election,—and "emphatically contradicts this statement by acknowledging its truthfulness. It is a notorious fact that whatever he may have thought about the matter before he left the province Mr. Rogers was quite willing to accept re-nomination at the hands of his party—that he cabled all the way from Paris to this effect—that the Liberal Convention was adjourned until this message was received and when it did come to hand Mr. Geo. E. Hughes was nominated as "a fit and proper person" to take the place of the man who had so unselfishly placed himself in their hands! In setting forth these facts THE EXAMINER is neither "slurring" nor "insulting" Hon. Mr. Rogers,—it is merely stating what is admitted to be true by the writer of the letter signed Geo. J. Rogers. Hon. Mr. Rogers has in my opinion, been shamefully treated, and his son, Mr. Geo. J. Rogers, should be manly enough to resent the conduct of his alleged friends instead of apparently allowing himself to be "used" by them.

SUPREME COURT.

The Court yesterday on motion of Mr. Stewart, Q. C., for the defendant granted a rule nisi to set aside the verdict in the case of Simon Joseph vs John Simon tried at Georgetown last July.

McKinnon vs Heater. This case was tried last July at Charlottetown before Judge Fitzgerald when verdict found for plaintiff. A rule for a non suit was afterwards granted on the ground that the plaintiff was not registered as partner. This rule was argued on Tuesday last. The court this morning discharged the rule with costs, holding that the question of the non-registry of the partnership should have been raised by a plea in the record. The verdict stands for the plaintiff.
