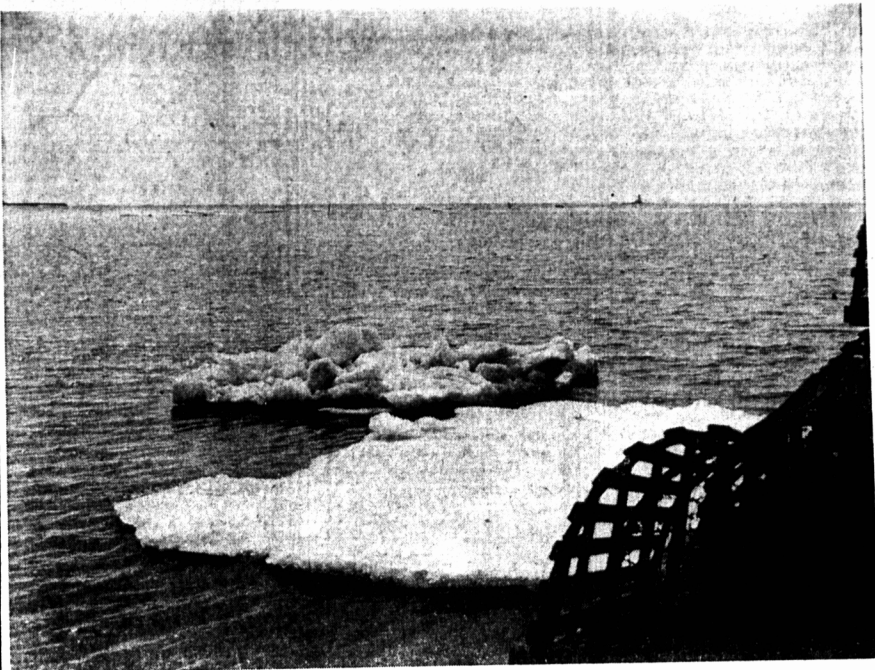

Brighter Future For The Carrot

"The trend now is to market carrots attractively prepackaged, in polyethylene bags," states a release issued by the Division of Horticulture, Ottawa. A large volume of fresh, imported carrots is handled in this way. The removal of carrot tops or leaves which are of no value to the consumer anyway, has resulted in a saving of shipping space and costs. "Actually, this should be good news for Canadian producers. Canadian grown carrots can be, and in fact are, also marketed in polyethylene bags. Thus, they can be sold on their merits and with the same packaging appeal of imported carrots. To compete successfully, two important features must be considered.

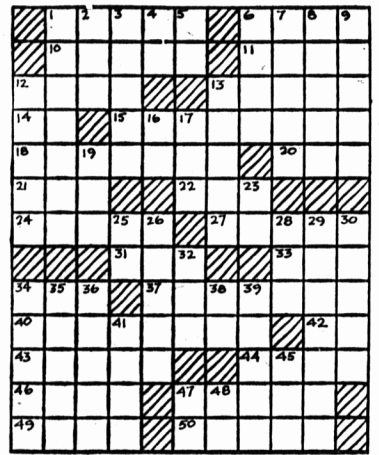
S'side Harbor Takes On Spring-like Look

Premier Refutes Charges Gov't Choosing Most Costly Route For New Highway

Premier A. W. Matheson in concluding the Budget Debate in the Legislature last night refuted charges by the Leader of the Opposition that the Government was choosing the most costly route to build the Trans Canada Highway from Bonshaw to Charlottetown and that the Government had lost money on the Chinese Bridge. The Premier also refuted statements that the employees at Falconwood Farm were being underpaid for over-work and that the Government had decided to sell Mermaid Lake. He spoke briefly about his plan for rural electrification. "The Leader of the Opposition stated that it was more costly to build the Trans Canada road through Churchill than any other way," stated Premier Matheson. "He was 100% wrong." Mr. Bell—"You have the information?" Premier—"You didn't ask for it." Mr. Bell—"I asked for it year in and year out. I don't ask you because you didn't have it." The Premier replied that he had asked for surveys of three possible routes for the road. "We asked for a survey from Bonshaw through Churchill, New Haven, Clyde River to Charlottetown; another from Bonshaw to Cornwall via North River Road; and one from Bonshaw to Cornwall via South Shore and no decision could be made until the figures were available. "It was decided that the cheapest road from Bonshaw was through Churchill. That's why the road is going where it is going. "The Leader of the Opposition made one statement that it cost \$30,000 to lay light pavement from Cornwall to New Haven and that we will lose quite a bit of money if we built the Trans Canada Highway over this route. I believe it was money well spent. Over the years since it was laid it has given dust-free roads." Mr. Bell—"It was put down to beat me in the last election." Premier—"If we acted the way he suggests we would still keep it for another election but we are not that type." Mr. Bell—"Why did you promise the bridges at North River and West River?" Premier—"We are beyond half-time to the next election and there will be no new West River Bridge. Last night the Leader of the Opposition asked why not have two paved roads, one road through New Haven and Clyde River. He wants all pavements in his own district. "Our poor friend from Second Kings where would he be supposed to fit? Instead of the Leader of the Opposition considering the Province as a whole he considers his own district only. He should forget his own district. I am not making promises now that will not be fulfilled." The Premier stated there was one paved road in the district he represented and that another road of light pavement had been laid last fall. "A delegation came to me three years ago and asked for a paved road to Lower Montague. They stated that 'Premier Jones told us we could get it.' I replied that anything Premier Jones wants to do for my district is perfectly all right with me. "They said that 'if you take off the ferry we will get the paved roads' and in the petition that was circulated it was written 'we agree to have the ferry removed.'" The Premier stated that the ferry cost \$12,000 a year to operate and that the road had been paid for through the savings within the three-year period. "If the people in your district do the same we will consider doing something for them." "If they take off the ferry they will get a bridge. We will consider it," stated the Leader of the Opposition. Premier—"That's the first reasonable thing you have said in two years." In reference to Mr. Bell's statement that the Government had

Entomological Talks Concluded

An invitation was extended to the Entomological Society of Canada to hold its next annual meeting in the Maritime Province in 1955 at Fredericton, N. B. This was contained in a resolution brought in when the Canadian Entomological Society met for their final sessions yesterday. It was suggested that if the Dominion Society could not accept the invitation for next year that it would still stand for the following year 1956. Votes of thanks were moved to the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. C. C. Baker, Mr. Walter Shaw and Mr. G. B. Oakland for their fine contribution towards the success of the meeting, and to all others who had helped in any way. This included the Ladies of Parkdale Women's Institute who provided the banquet of Wednesday night. Yesterday's discussions dealt with "Field crop and vegetable insect control" and "a comparison of high and low gallonage sprays and dusting on potatoes," by Dr. F. L. MacEwen of the Entomological Laboratory, Charlottetown. Mr. L. C. Callbeck dealt with the matter of "Fungicides in potato sprays and dusts" and Mr. A. B. Stevenson discussed potato spraying schedules in relation to insect and virus disease control. Other subjects discussed were "Control of wireworms with soil insecticides" by Mr. C. J. Fox of Kentville; "Root maggot Control" by Mr. Ray Morris Saint John's, Newfoundland; and "Barley jointworm" by Mr. F. M. Cannon. In the afternoon a panel discussion with Mr. M. E. Neary, of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture at Truro, acting chairman took up the matter of "Literature review on controlling flies in dairy barns, pigeries etc." Participating in this discussion were Messrs. N. A. Patterson of Kentville and C. C. Smith of Fredericton.
