### AN ANNIVERSARY REMINIS- CENCE.

At Charlottetown on Tuesday, Sir  
Charles Tupper mentioned in his ad-  
dress that thirty-six years ago that  
night there had assembled in Charlot-  
tewtown the conference, in promoting  
which he was a mover, that had  
brought about the confederation of  
British North America. The Quebec  
Conference, where the basis of union  
was adopted, was the result of the  
earlier meeting in the P. E. I. capital,  
the greater having grown out of the  
lesser scheme. To have shared in the  
work of such a gathering more than a  
third of a century ago is no slight  
claim to distinction, and it is only one  
that Sir Charles Tupper presents. This  
generation hardly knows how hard was  
the work put on those who, in Nova  
Scotia especially, undertook to per-  
fect the union of the provinces. An  
opposition, as fierce as it was unrea-  
sonable, developed at Halifax and en-  
listed the services of many of the pro-  
vince's ablest men. Mr. Joseph Howe  
used the greatest powers of oratory  
ever possessed by a Canadian to de-  
stroy what Sir Charles Tupper had  
worked to bring about. Sir Charles  
Tupper was almost alone in the House  
of Commons as a defender of feder-  
ation in his native province. Sir Ed-  
ward Kenny, a senator, was the one  
Nova Scotian for years in the federal  
ministry. Events were working for  
Sir Charles Tupper's remnant, how-  
ever, and in 1869 Mr. Howe sealed his  
acceptance of the union by becoming  
one of Sir John Macdonald's minister.  
That broke up the anti's; and Mr. Field-  
ing at present one of Sir Wilfrid  
Laurier's colleagues, is about the last  
one of prominence that is left. The  
recalling of these events in Charlot-  
tewtown must have appealed to what  
was broad in the minds of those who  
were gathered in the historic city. If it  
also forced their attention on the fact  
that the Conservatives were the one  
constructive party in Canada's build-  
ing the fault was chiefly that of Sir Charles  
Tupper's opponents, past and present.  
The platform that was wide enough to  
hold George Brown and John A. Mac-  
donald would not have been crowded if  
a Jones and a Fielding had climbed up  
on it alongside a Tupper and a Howe.  
—Montreal Gazette.

Sir Charles Tupper is sometimes re-  
proached by his opponents for dealing  
in ancient history, but it would be  
hard for him to surpass the recent  
achievement of the Hon David Mills,  
minister of justice, who, in his address  
to the electors of Bothwell, reviewed  
the events of the last thirty three years,  
and only reached the date 1896 in the  
closing paragraph of his speech. It  
was remarkable, too, that instead of  
speaking of what his own party had  
done, he gave almost all his attention  
to the alleged misdoings of the other  
fellows. The Riel rebellion and the  
Pacific scandal takes up a great deal  
more room in the report than any of  
the issues of the last quarter of a cen-  
tury. Senator Mills is probably living  
in the past because he finds the at-  
mosphere more congenial than it is in the  
present.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—At Montreal Mr. Foster quoted Sir  
Wilfrid's words,—"Nothing is to go" for  
Tarte; when Tarte goes I go," and remind-  
ed the people that Sir Wilfrid came all  
the way to Montreal to address his eulogy  
to the Minister of Public Works and  
solicit for Mr. Tarte the sympathy and  
support of his fellow-citizens. Mr. Tarte  
had, Mr. Foster continued, made the Ad-  
ministration bright and celebrated for  
integrity in public affairs." This sarca-  
stic cut was received with roars of laugh-  
ter.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND.—An Ottawa des-  
patch says: The committee of the  
patriotic fund are prepared to receive and  
deal with applications on behalf of the  
Canadian volunteers, who have returned  
to Canada, and it is suggested that offi-  
cers commanding corps in Canada and the  
several branches of the soldiers wives  
league will be good enough to communi-  
cate at once with the secretary of the  
patriotic fund, Ottawa.

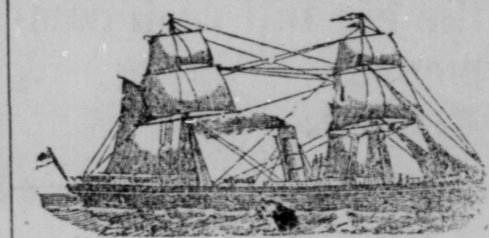
