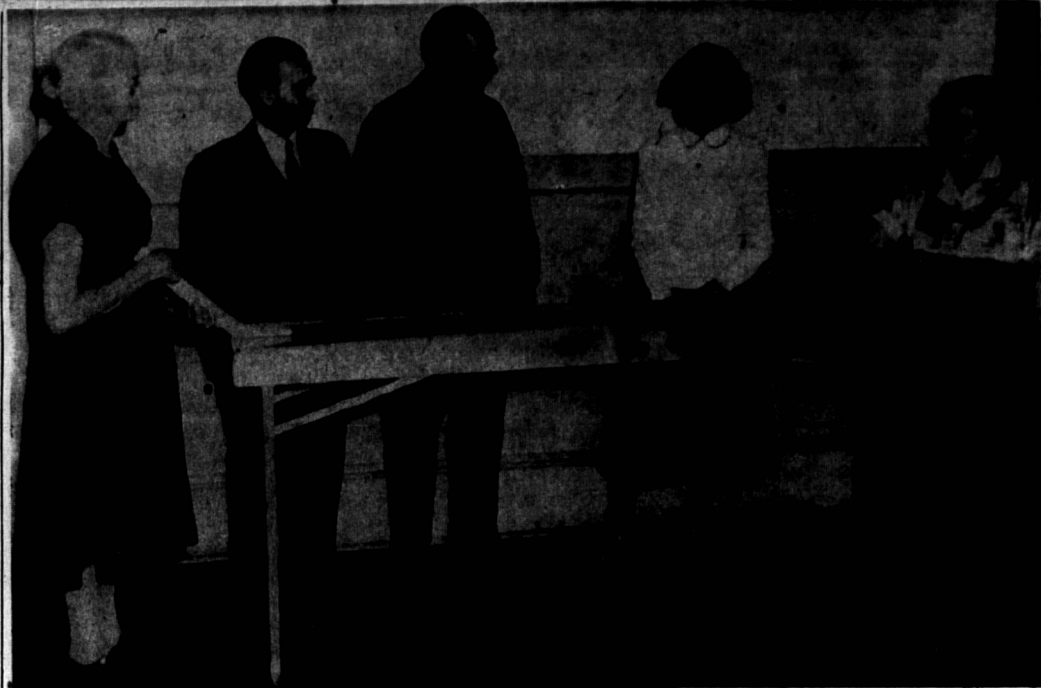


TABLE BOWLING PLAYED BLIND

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAMES E. GORVEATT

It was with deep sorrow and a keen sense of loss that the many relatives and friends of the late James E. Gorveatt learned of his passing in the early morning of June 18th, 1957, at his home in Nine Mile Creek. Although in failing health for the past four years, which period was marked by progressive stages of a dreaded disease, his death came as a shock to the members of his family and to this community.

The late Mr. Gorveatt, or Jimmie, as he was familiarly known to all his friends endeared himself to all who had the privilege of his acquaintance, he was especially kind to little children who were always attracted to him and shall miss his cheery smile and kind greeting. Always cheerful and ever ready to give a helping hand, he was never known to complain even in the midst of extended periods of weakness and long hours of distress. The deceased gave testimony to his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

The deceased was born in Cumberland, P.E.I., fifty-six years ago and was the son of the late Josiah Gorveatt and his wife Annie MacGregor.
