Tragedy in Real Life.

In Montreal the following little tragedy has come to light:—

In former days a brilliant marriage took place in the Anglican cathedral here, between a young gentleman, the son of an exalted dignitary in the Church, and a young lady of good family, the daughter of a high Government army official.

Among them was a cousin of the young husband's, and with this gay cavalier the wife became so intimate as to excite the priest's gossip and sarcastic remarks of the other inmates of the house.

WOLSELEY'S VICTORY.

TELEGRAPHIC FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.

LONDON, Aug. 26.

The War Office has received the following from General Garnet Wolsley:—

ISMAILIA, Aug. 25 (evening).—I pushed on again this morning at daybreak. The enemy had a strongly entrenched position at Mapatta. They withdrew their guns, however, last night. They had twelve guns in the action yesterday. The force at my disposal this morning was the first division and the English cavalry, with 16 guns.

LONDON, Aug. 26.

The Standard's Ismailia despatch says that the first shell fired by the enemy on Thursday passed a few feet over General Wolsley's head and took off the leg of a horse ten yards behind him.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 26.

Arabi Pacha's armored train left the position of the enemy, at King Osman, at six o'clock this evening, and advanced about 300 yards, when two heavy guns on the water-works hill fired five rounds against the train.

ISMAILIA, Aug. 26.

The enemy's loss in the fighting on Thursday with General Wolsley is estimated by some as high as 400.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 27.

It is reported that several staff officers have deserted Arabi Pacha and have given General Wolsley important information.
