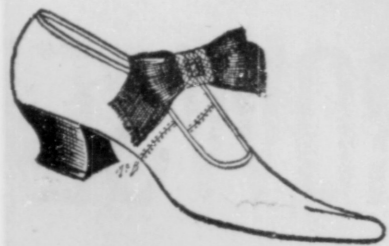

SIXTY LIVES LOST AND ACRES OF TEA DESTROYED.

Disastrous Fire in a Boston Lodging House.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Sept. 26.—The Atlas Line steamer Orduler, which left Kingston for Baltimore, has foundered on the south coast of Jamaica.

Five lives have been lost including the first officer.

CALCUTTA, Sept. 26.—Earthquakes, floods and terrible landslides occurred at and near Darjeeling last night.

Sixty lives have been lost and a thousand acres of tea destroyed.

BOSTON, Sept. 26.—Nine people were badly burned, one probably fatally, at a fire in a lodging house in the South end last night.

The following are at the city hospital: Mrs. Rena Butler, Mrs. Sarah B. Lovleac, Miss Lillian Tyrell, Hewitt Lovleac, Waverly Greene and Chesterfield Stewart.

The others burned are Miss Tyrell, Robert and Andrew Lovleac.

Big Offer For Dreyfus.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—Immediately on receipt of the news that the president of France had pardoned Captain Dreyfus, the Siegel-Cooper Company, of this city, sent to Dreyfus a cable message, of which the following is a translation.

Captain Alfred Dreyfus, Rennes, France: "We will pay you one million francs for manuscript of your side of the case, to be published in book form. Answer." Siegel-Cooper Co., New York."

Interesting Quarterly Session at Fredericton

District Division No. 4 convened in quarterly session with Refuge Division, Fredericton, on Thursday afternoon, 21st inst. District W. P., A. W. Tanton, presided. The usual routine of business was gone through. Miss Jannette McLeod, of Hunter River, was elected District Supt. of juvenile work. A committee was appointed to work in conjunction with Grand Scribe Weeks with regard to furthering the interests of the order and to especially help weak divisions throughout the District. The public meeting at night was a grand success. The large hall was packed—many were without seats. District W. P., occupied the chair. The programme, which was a lengthy one, consisted of speeches by P. G. W. P., J. C. Clarke, Esq., E. S. Weeks, and Mr. Henry Ruckham, Prov. Deputy. The address of welcome was given by Mr. G. W. H. Stevenson. Excellent music was rendered by the Refuge Division choir. A solo by Miss E. Weeks was well received. Readings by Mr. C. B. Warren, of Clarendon, were quite in keeping with his reputation and were well received. Recitations by Mr. Hill and Mr. Deacon, also by Mrs. J. W. McLennan were heartily applauded. But the rendition of a song by Mr. Herbert Toombs (the accompaniment played by Mrs. Toombs) brought down the house, and he was most enthusiastically encored. His second selection was received with prolonged applause.

NORWALK, Conn., Sept. 23.—This Stets of Connecticut can boast of many eccentric characters, but in the case of Peter Phillips, who married his mother-in-law, the ideal of courage and peculiar daring has apparently been reached. If what the wife, who was the mother-in-law, says is true, Mr. Phillips may find himself in prison as a result of his intrepidity.

Phillips loved his first wife, who died two years ago, and losing her he determined to take her mother as a sort of consolation prize. This he did, and was presumably happy until she came to him one day and said she needed a new set of teeth. This brought to his mind a conviction that she was too old for him, whereupon he very frankly told her so.
