Successful Field Day Held At New London

The 1951 Field Day at New London Illustration Station, proved to be an auspicious occasion in the fact that in addition to the guest speaker, Mr. Shuh of Nova Scotia, and the presence of Dr. Fisher in his capacity of Director of the new set-up of Veterinary Services, four very brilliant and distinguished agriculturists from India and Pakistan were present.

Miss Eleanor Clapp, Supervisor of Handicraft, Provincial Sanatorium, Charlottetown, addressed the ladies at this point, while the farmers were taken on a tour of the farm by Mr. W. N. Black, who reviewed the experimental work active on fertilized pastures and crops at this station.

Miss Clapp's address and display of handicraft, made by patients in the Provincial Sanatorium, created great interest and considerable amazement at the fact that patients who are required to spend most of their time resting can accomplish so great a quantity of such beautiful work.

Dr. S. Hedayetullah Director of Agriculture for the State of East Bengal, Pakistan, was next called upon. Also of a brilliant mind and well grounded in his chosen profession, Dr. Hedayetullah holds several important posts in the agricultural field, in addition to the above mentioned.

The third of the delegates to be presented by Dr. Parent was Dr. J. K. Dubey, Director of Agriculture for the State of Bhopal, India. Dubey received his B.Sc. and M.Sc. from the University of Illinois, U. S. A., and his Ph.D. from London University, England, and spoke briefly of plans to develop in his native land, ideas gathered here.

Others who spoke briefly were Hon. C. G. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Walter Shuh, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, who made the point "that if delegates can come thousands of miles from India and Pakistan to this Province, who are near should examine the work being done by the Experimental Farm and Illustration Stations.
