Russia Would Enter Hockey Team For World Title

EDMONTON, Jan. 15 (CP)—Russia today sought permission from the International Ice Hockey Federation to enter the world amateur hockey championships at the winter Olympics in Oslo, Norway, next month.

Decision of the I.I.H.F. is expected to hinge on whether the Russians want to play hockey or politics.

The application was received today by Dr. W. G. Hardy of Edmonton, council member of the I.I.H.F. who retired as its president last August after a three-year term.

The Russian cable request came from a man named Korotcov, president of the hockey branch of the Soviet Cultural Activities Organization in Moscow. He addressed it to Dr. Hardy under the apparent assumption he still headed the I.I.H.F.

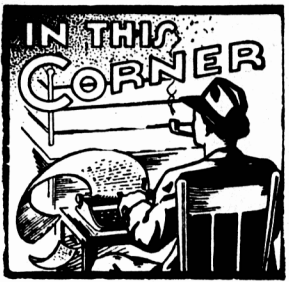

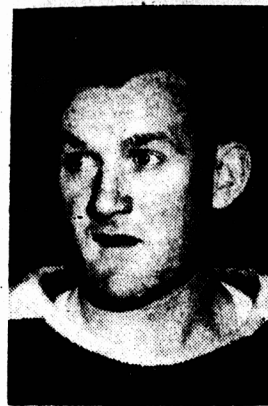

The rate of change of the goal-tenders in the Maritime Major Hockey League this season has probably been as great or greater than that of any league anywhere. Only one of the goalies who started the season with a Maritime Major Hockey League club is still with that club and there have been reports that he may be going to another team. The other five netminders have long since disappeared and their places have been taken by more and less capable goalies.

The first man to get the axe was Jackie Gibson of the Moncton Hawks whose place was taken by the capable Don Lockhart of the Toronto Maple Leafs and he is subject to 24-hour recall by that team. Next on the list was Larry Fréchette of the Halifax Saints who asked for and was given his release. Into his shoes stepped Jim Matson who gave up in favor of "Nipper" O'Hearn and now O'Hearn has left his shoes stepped by Phil Hughes of the Syracuse Chiefs. Strachan was supposed to leave Montreal by plane this morning and arrive in Moncton at four o'clock. The Saints play the Miners tonight at Halifax.

Then Nick Pidsodny of Sydney, who is being acclaimed as the most travelled goalie in the business, got the call to Buffalo. Into his shoes stepped Cliff Hicks who started the season with the Glace Bay Miners. Bob Arnell, who was on his way to Charlottetown at one point, took over from Hicks at Glace Bay. Next it was the turn of the Saint John Beavers and they lost Phil Hughes to Buffalo Bisons. Gord Mabee has been doing the netminding at St. John since the departure of the lanky Hughes.

The capable Hal Gordon of the Islanders has been used only sparingly since his injury in Sydney about six weeks ago. Frank Roper of Charlottetown played two games for the Islanders and then Ray Frederick took over. Frederick has played most of the games since coming here from the Chicoutimi Saguenens. There were rumors that Gordon would be going to Saint John in exchange for a wingman but at 11:30 last night no transaction had been completed and the trading deadline was midnight.

Art Chapman, the general manager of the Buffalo Bisons, would need to be a juggler, expert to place all the goalies he has at his disposal. He is apparently keeping Hughes as sub-goalie for Buffalo because Lou Crowdis played in the Bisons nets during Saturday and Sunday games. Pidsodny is in Vancouver, and reportedly on the reserve list of the Halifax Saints.

The executive of the City Hockey League took prompt action in handing out Ralph Josey a three-game suspension for striking referee Joe O'Connell during the Saints-Rovers game last night. The executive has stated that it will take severe disciplinary steps to curb unsportsmanlike tactics during the games and this no doubt will be appreciated by both the players and those interested in the league. During the past decade a City League was operated here and very rarely were there any thubarbs or trouble of any kind.

At least four local players plan on leaving for Chester Basin to lineup with the Chester Basin Red Wings in the South Shore Hockey League in Nova Scotia. Ralph and Wally Shepherd, Cliff Jackson and goalie Frank Roper are the four who are reported to be leaving. The Chester team wanted four forwards, a defenseman and a goalie. Forward Jack Brown and defenseman Ralph Josey also had offers but turned them down.

Jim MacKenzie is around on his feet again in the Prince Edward Island Hospital with his shoulder separation while Conny Bonhomme is still bed-ridden with his broken elbow. Following the Islanders-Hawks game here Monday night Marcel Clements paid the boys a short visit and it was a gesture that was greatly appreciated by the injured players.

Jack "Spy" Ready, who played his first game in the City League last night is still the property of the Charlottetown Islanders. Ready attempted to secure his release yesterday but his request was refused. This may mean that coach Leo Lamoureux plans on using Jack now that injuries have left the Islanders short-handed.

Jack Stewart May Quit At End of Season

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (CP)—Black Jack Stewart, one of the top defencemen in the National Hockey League for more than a decade, may be through at the end of this season.

The prediction was made today by Eddie Goodfellow, coach of Chicago Black Hawks, who offered hockey writers some of the reasons for his team's poor showing this season.

Goodfellow, whose last-place Hawks meet New York Rangers here tomorrow night, said the 34-year-old 130-pound rearguard hasn't come back as expected after spending much of last season on the sidelines with a slipped spinal disk.

"This will be his last season," said Goodfellow. His latest remarks contrasted with his pre-season statement that "Stewart is all right. He's the same guy you used to know and that's bad news for the rest of the league."

Stewart, a native of Pilot Mound, Minn., broke in with Detroit Red Wings in the 1938-39 season and was a consistently outstanding star until he was traded to the Hawks with four other players.

Expected to be a powerhouse on the Chicago defence, he hasn't shown the fire that made him a regular member of all-star teams and one of the hardest-hitting rearguards in hockey.

Goodfellow said Stewart's inability to come back was just part of the Chicago blues. He mentioned the loss this season of Fred Hucul, the promising rookie who developed a mysterious muscular ailment. Eddie said today that Hucul now is back with St. Louis of the American Hockey League and might eventually return to the Hawks.

Coach Bill Cook of the Rangers addressed the luncheon and announced he was benching forward Nick Mickoski because he "seems to have trouble skating and seems to have trouble getting his shots off." Mickoski will remain in New York, however.

Louis Plans To Challenge Non-White Rule

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 15 (AP)—Former heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis and two other Negro golfers showed up to challenge what they said was a Professional Golfers Association ban on non-white players.

They appeared for pre-tournament qualifying tests in the U.S. P.G.A.-sanctioned San Diego open, starting Thursday.

Horton Smith, the P.G.A.'s president, announced meantime, that the Louis case was not closed and that he would present it to the P.G.A.'s national tournament committee. He said he had not personally barred Louis.
