TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Arrival of the New Brunswick.

Boston, Oct. 17. The International Line steamer New Brunswick, arrived at her wharf here shortly after midnight. A large crowd of people having relatives on board were waiting at the wharf and there was much rejoicing when the steamer made her appearance. The officers of the steamer who knew nothing of the sensational reports about their vessel being burned were much surprised at the reception given them. The delay of the steamer was explained by the statement that she was a long time at anchor near Machias, on account of rough weather. Mrs. Margaret Forsythe, one of the passengers, died of consumption during the voyage.

Suffocated While on a Drunk.

HALIFAX, Oct. 17. A soldier named Gallagher died very suddenly this morning. He got on a drunk Saturday night, in company with two other soldiers. A fight ensued, a crowd gathered, and the police took charge of his two companions. Gallagher was found lying on his face, unconscious. He was removed to the Hospital and died this morning. An inquest was held, with the verdict "Died of suffocation while intoxicated." Gallagher was 21 years old and one of the draft which arrived on the Himalaya.

The Recent Storm.

LONDON, Oct. 17. Latest reports show that the effects of the recent storm on the south and west coasts were terrible. Ten bodies have washed ashore at Glamorgan coast. Reports have been received from all parts of the kingdom, telling of disasters from the hurricane and loss of shipping and life.

Yellow Fever Raging.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 17. There are 275 cases of Yellow Fever at Biloxi, Mass. A state of quarantine has been declared against the town.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Oct. 17. E. J. Rowell, shot his brother dead in a quarrel to-day. He is under arrest.
