Doctors and Tobacco.

A late report by the Medical Department of the United States Naval Academy, at Annapolis, Maryland, enumerates the following as the result of the use of tobacco in the school:—

"Functional derangement of the digestive, circulatory and nervous systems, manifesting themselves in the form of headache, confusion of intellect, loss of memory, impaired power of attention, lassitude, indisposition to muscular effort, nausea, want of appetite, dyspepsia, palpitation, tremulousness, disturbed sleep, impaired vision, etc., any one of which materially lessens the capacity for study and application."

"The board are of opinion, therefore, that the regulations against the use of tobacco in any form cannot be too stringent, and further, that, while smoking should be wholly interdicted, especial care should be exercised to prevent the substitution of chewing, the more deleterious practice."

On similar grounds, without doubt, it has been recommended by the Board of Visitors and Directors of West Point that the use of tobacco be prohibited among the cadets.
