Quebec's Disgrace

ANOTHER REVELATION.

A Nice Attorney-General.

QUEBEC, Oct. 28.
Yesterday was another sensational day before the Royal Commission, and another ministerial hat has dropped into the basket. Picaud admitted that a third note of \$20,000 endorsed by P. Vallier had been in existence, and that the same had been taken in charge by Attorney-General Robidoux, who attempted to get it discounted at various places in Montreal. The note was also accompanied by a letter from Mr. Webb of the Union Bank, setting forth the use for which it was applied. This kills Robidoux, and it may be said that the revelation was not unexpected.
As soon as the affair came out, Mercier left court and called a Cabinet meeting to discuss the situation. At first it was supposed that Langelier and Robidoux would resign, but it is now believed that Mercier insists that all shall go down together.

CHAPLEAU'S RESIGNATION

Said to be in the Premier's Hands.

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.
There is a rumor abroad, which a thought to be official, and seems well authenticated, that Hon. Mr. Chapleau has placed his resignation as Secretary of State in the Premier's hands.
Mr. Chapleau, in an interview to-day, positively stated that he considered himself entitled to more consideration than he had received, both on his own account and on behalf of his province. He stated that he was going to Montreal to-night to consult his friends and would be guided by their advice. The Premier, on being asked about the matter, declined to make any statement.

Shipping Disasters

A Vessel Founders With all on Board.

BOSTON, Oct. 28.
Capt. Chute, of the schr. Seraphine, arrived yesterday from Bear River, N. S. He reports that he experienced very rough weather. Last Saturday at 4.30 p. m., when 35 miles south from Matinicus, he saw a four-masted schooner founder with all hands. On reaching the point where the vessel was seen to founder no sign of her was visible, nor was there any wreckage of any description found in the vicinity. Capt. Chute says she was apparently about 800 tons register, painted black, had bright mastsheads. He could give no further description.

DISASTER AT SEA.

LARGE STEAMER SUNK.

BERLIN, Oct. 28.
During a severe storm last Sunday a large steamer was seen to founder off Bremen. Wreckage has been coming ashore ever since, but the name of the vessel has not been learned.

Anti-Foreign Movement in China.

The Government Powerless.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.
A despatch from Shanghai says that the anti-foreign movements continue in Hanan province. The Government is apparently unable to prevent the spreading of the uprising.

A LUCKY YOUNGSTER

LONDON, Oct. 28.
Frederick Smith, aged 22, (Conservative) son of late Hon Wm Henry Smith, was today elected member of Parliament for the Strand Division of this city, in succession to his father.

General Telegraphic News.

MADRID, Oct. 26.—The terrible storms that have prevailed for several days show no signs of abating. The principal river throughout the entire country is rising steadily and rapidly.
LONDON, Oct. 26.—Two anti-Parnellites named Clarke and Kennedy, brought action against the treasurer of the National League to recover contributions which they allege were devoted to purposes contrary to those for which they subscribed. The recorder of Galway gave judgment for plaintiff with costs. The case has caused considerable sensation.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—A San Francisco despatch says Dr. Nicholas Russel, a well-

known physician, yesterday challenged Vartz Monich, Russian consul, to mortal combat. The affair arose from troubles in the Russian-Greek church in San Francisco. In his challenge Dr. Russel says: "In case a single drop of the blood of your Polish gentry ancestors still runs in your veins, you know what you have to do. I am at your service any time with any weapons you suggest."

DUBLIN, Oct. 26.—The Tories have selected Capt. Sarsfield to making the fighting in Parnell's old stronghold in their interest, Alderman Scott having resigned in his favor. This action, however, does not meet with the unanimous approval of the Conservative leaders.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 26.—Two children of Robert Newsham, of Birtle, while alone in their parents' house, found a package of gunpowder, which they ignited. The explosion set fire to the house and both children perished in the flames.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Floods in England, as the result of two weeks of successive storms, continue to do a great amount of damage. The Thames river has overflowed its banks to the extent of a mile in some places. At Windsor boats are being used to convey people from place to place.

DUBLIN, Oct. 27.—Michael Davitt has declined to contest the seat for North Kilkenny. He has decided he can be more useful outside of parliament till the general elections occur.
