Consider Kremlin Caught Off Guard In Summit Deal

LONDON (AP)—Sudden Soviet caution in approaching the summit created an impression among diplomats here Sunday that the West had caught the Kremlin off guard.

States were reported united in a determination to press forward to test Soviet sincerity. Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko appeared to be manoeuvring for time by meeting the Western ambassadors individually, instead of together.

That may be one purpose of their charge Friday that the United States was risking world war by sending its nuclear bombers flying toward Russia. U.S. officials, denying that a war could be started accidentally, said the planes turn back automatically before they get near Soviet borders.

Princess' Plane Makes Stop To Refuel At Gander

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad (Reuters) — Princess Margaret returned to Trinidad Sunday amid a burst of Caribbean excitement undampened by a tropical shower of rain.

The 27-year-old princess, a hit in the heart of calypso-land when she visited the islands three years ago, returned for an 18-day tour and the inauguration of the New West Indies Federation's first Parliament.

Churchill III, Family Worried

LONDON (AP) — Sources close to the family of Sir Winston Churchill disclosed this weekend the former prime minister has suffered a new attack of illness that alarmed his household.

The 83-year-old wartime leader was reported to be better now although not entirely recovered.

Churchill recovered only last month from a serious attack of pneumonia and pleurisy. He was stricken while vacationing on the French Riviera.

New Drug Appears To Aid Some Aged Mental Patients

NEW YORK (AP)—A drug described as a brain stimulant seems to improve the health and behavior of some aged mental patients, two veterans administration researchers said Saturday.

The drug, akin to a common food-flavoring agent, was fed daily in tomato juice to some 22 elderly patients suffering from schizophrenia, a mental disease evidenced by detachment, depression and apathy.

Some patients improved so much they could be released to nursing homes, the doctors said. The test on 42 patients of the Veterans Administration Hospital at Bedford, Mass., was reported by Drs. Louis P. Finkle and L. J. Reyna in the Journal of Clinical and Experimental Psychopathology.

However, a spokesman for Britain's Atomic Energy Authority said it will be several months before measurements can be made of radioactive strontium, caesium and cobalt — nuclear bomb-test byproducts most likely to cause genetic damage to future generations.
