THEY PASS US BY

Even in February some migrants have left their holiday resorts and are returning to their true homes. Although many are content to stop in settled parts, a large number of species, both land and water birds, only rest and feed here, then continue north.

Most of the Tree Sparrows have spent the winter south of our boundary line, and stay in southern Canada only long enough to rest and feed. Then they are off to the vast areas that lie north of the tree line.

It will perhaps be near the end of May before the Grey-cheeked Thrushes journey past us. These are birds noted for their speedy rate of migration. They winter in northern South America, and do not start home until most species have left. At first their pace is somewhat ordinary; then when they reach northern Florida near the last of April they speed up, flying faster as the season progresses, until their rate is more than 180 miles a day.

These flights seem to us very long, but other birds have migration routes longer still. Downy Woodpeckers begin in southern South America and nest in the grassy tundras of our far north. Jaegers start from the south Atlantic, Golden Plovers from southern Argentina, and one species of Phalarope from little islands off southern South America. All migrate to the Arctic coast.
