The Dominion Exhibition.

In the Senate Debates of the 15th inst., we find that Mr. Haythorne inquired if the resolutions and proceedings of public meetings held here had been received by the Ministers of Finance and Agriculture.

Revenue Returns.

The Canada Gazette contains an un-revised statement of inland revenue accrued during the month of January, 1884, viz:—

Our Post Office Department.

The Postmaster General's report states that during the fiscal year 1882-83 two hundred and twenty-four additional Post Offices were established in different parts of the Dominion, making a total in operation at the end of October last of 6,395.

The following figures will be of interest to illustrate the extent of the service and the amount of business done during the last fiscal year:

The following is a statement of the revenue and expenditure by Provinces:

In the year 1881-82 the revenue amounted to \$2,022,098.44, including the postage on newspapers and periodicals sent from the offices of publication, which was subsequently abolished.

The amount of money orders issued during the year was \$9,496,899.62. It is announced that a general increase marked the operations of the money order system both domestic and international, during the year.

which took place on the 1st of July, 1882. Domestic business increased 9 per cent. as against an increase of 5 per cent. in 1881, as compared with 1881.

One of the most interesting parts of the report is that which contains the tables of the Post Office Savings Bank. The following is a statement of the business done compared with that of 1881-82:—

The deposits increased last year by 12,109; the amount of deposits by \$390,277; the number of open accounts by 9,600; and the amount due depositors by \$2,502,576.
