IN MEMORIAM

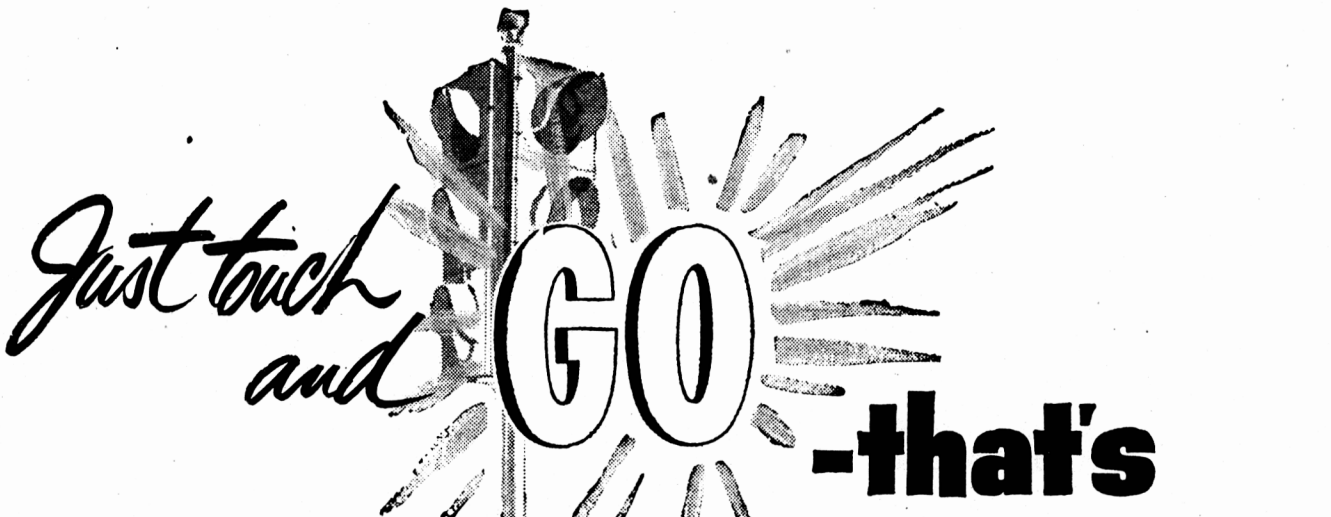
DAVID BEER HOLMES

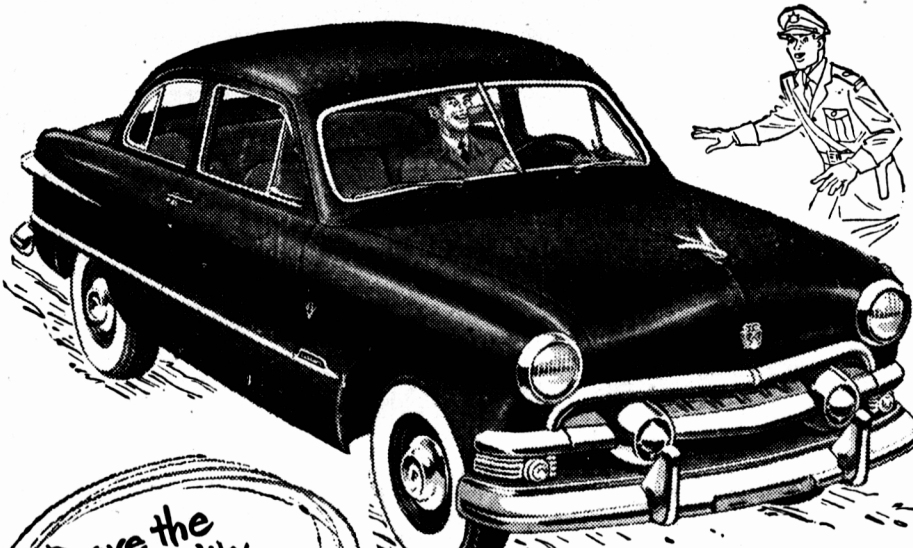
He was a very kind neighbour and friend, willing to help where needed and was a loving husband and father. His late years were spent with his son Alonzo until his death.
