1,000 Pounds Milk Produced For Every Person In Canada

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian cows will produce 1,000 pounds of milk for every man, woman and child in the country this year, president J. M. Hartwick of the National Dairy Council said here.
Canada's population totalled 19,000,000 persons last week and farmers and processors will distribute 19,000,000 pounds of milk in some form at home or abroad from 50 countries in the export field, Mr. Hartwick told the council's 46th annual meeting. Sales in 1963 would achieve a record, he said, a "reasonably satisfactory" state of equilibrium between total milk supply and demand in 1963 for the first time in 20 years.

Kennedy Signs Test Ban Pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — The limited nuclear test-ban treaty was formally ratified here by President Kennedy, who pledged that the United States will observe it "in letter and in spirit."
Kennedy said the United States regards the historic pact, banning all except underground nuclear tests, as "a clear and honorable national commitment to the cause of man's survival."
Sitting at an antique desk in the floodlit treaty room on the second floor of the White House, Kennedy declared: "As president of the United States and with the advice and consent of the Senate, I now sign the instruments of ratification in this treaty."
