The late blight situation has remained approximately the same since the last bulletin. Nova Scotia has continued to be free of the disease and only one new infection has been found on Prince Edward Island.

The below normal rainfall in July and the general coolness that has characterized the season to date have prevented the disease from becoming established. There should be little change in the picture so long as the present weather pattern prevails.

The cool weather has prevented aphid populations from building up rapidly. However, they are present in moderate numbers in many potato fields.
