Large shipments of Maritime cattle for England are to be made from Rimouski on Saturday and Monday in the Beaver Line steamer "Lake Winnipeg," and the steamer "Dominion." The cattle have commenced to arrive at this station. On Tuesday night 6 car loads containing 91 head of cattle, of which seven were bulls, reached here from St. John, being consigned to Mr. M. Coughlan. These cattle were gathered in the vicinity of Kentville, Nova Scotia, and it is supposed came to St. John from that town by steamer. Last night another car load, shipped by Mr. J. McDonald, from Salisbury, arrived here. The most of these cattle were placed in pasture, as they are not to leave here till Friday. A lot of Westmorland and Cumberland cattle are to join the shipments, but had not arrived last night. Messrs. Avar, Humphry and Fawcett, the Westmorland shippers, will send about 150 head. The total shipments will reach, it is said, about 400 head.—*Moncton Times.*

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled "An Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown," and also in pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled, "An Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown, and all Acts amending the same," I do hereby give Public Notice that an election of

One Common Councilman,

to supply the vacancy in the office of Councilor for Ward No. Two in the said City, instead and place of WILLIAM KOUGHAN, Esquire, will be held on

SATURDAY,

the Sixteenth (16th) day of OCTOBER, A. D. 1880, in the said Ward, and at the place following, that is to say:

At or near the Warehouse of Richard Heartz, Esq., fronting on Sidney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets; and at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARD.

Ward Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street.

NOMINATION DAY.

Act 43 Victoria, Cap. 5.—"Seven days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councilors the persons or candidates for the office of Mayor or Councilor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates. There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor at the same time a fee of Ten Dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councilor a fee of Five Dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the Election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councilor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon until the hour of Four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.

Qualification of Electors:—See Act 43 Victoria, Sections 20 and 63.

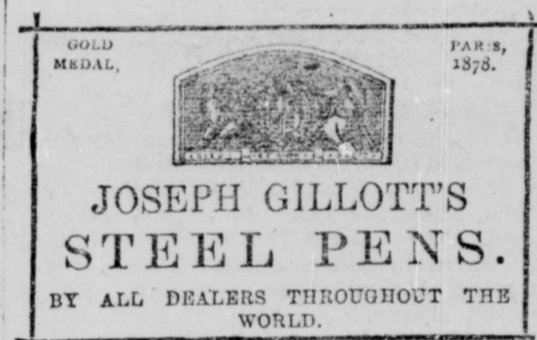
